857 "In The Presence Of The Father From The Beginning"

- 858 Taking humanity upon Him, Christ came to be one with humanity,

- 861 ginning, He who was the express image of the invisible God, was
- alone able to reveal the character of the Deity to mankind. He was in
- all things made like unto His brethren. He became flesh even as we
