Ellen G. White Treatment Of Erring Pupils In Sabbath School

- 1 God has given us a revelation disclosing to us divine acquirements.
- 2 The Lord has presented our duties before us in relation to Himself
- 3 and to our fellow men. None of us are excusable in following our
- 4 own way, choosing our own course of action, for God's will and
- 5 God's way have been presented to us in clear light. We are to
- 6 represent the character of Christ to sever from us every
- 7 disposition, every trait of character that, if cherished, would
- 8 make us an influence to lead souls away from Christ in place of
- 9 **leading them to Him.** As the Bible is a revelation of the will God to
- 10 man, we should earnestly study that we may know what is truth and
- 11 how to practice it. {Ms43-1892.1}
- 12 In Sabbath school work we shall be called upon to deal with
- 13 those who make mistakes, who fall into sin and error. Christ has
- 14 given us lessons in His Word that are very plain in regard to the
- 15 treatment of the erring, but many have failed to practice these
- 16 lessons. They have not been studied and treasured in the heart
- so that the Holy Spirit could enlighten the darkened
 understanding and melt and break the stony heart of both
- 19 teacher and pupil. The Holy Spirit will make the heart sensitive,
- 20 sympathetic, and rid it of pride and selfishness. {Ms43-1892.2}
- 21 Pupils in Sabbath school are liable to annoy the teacher by their
- 22 misconduct. But the teacher must not speak sharp words and
- 23 manifest an uncontrolled spirit, for in so doing he will not be
- 24 using the sword of the Spirit, but the weapons of Satan.
- 25 Although the misconduct of the scholar is trying, although the
- 26 evil must be corrected, the rules observed, and justice respected
- 27 yet let the teacher keep the way of the Lord and mingle mercy
- 28 with justice. Let him look to the cross of Calvary, beholding there
- 29 how mercy and truth have met together, how righteousness and
- 30 peace have kissed each other. There, through the divine sacrifice,
- 31 man may be reconciled to God. {Ms43-1892.3}

- 32 In contemplating the love of Christ, your heart will be softened
- 33 to deal with the youth as with younger members of the Lord's
- 34 family. You will remember that they are Christ's property, and
- your disposition will be to deal with them after the manner in
- 36 which Christ has dealt with you. {Ms43-1892.4}
- 37 Harsh dealing will never help the youth to see his errors, or aid
- 38 **him to reform.** Let the rules and regulations of the school be carried
- 39 out in the spirit of Jesus, and when reproof must be given, let this
- 40 disagreeable work be done with sorrow blended with love. Do
- 41 not feel that it is your work to openly rebuke the pupil and thus
- 42 humiliate him before the whole school. This will not be a proper
- 43 example to set before the children, for it will be a seed that will
- 44 **bear a like harvest.** {Ms43-1892.5}
- 45 Never publish the errors of any pupil outside the circle in which
- 46 they must be known, for, in this way, sympathy will not be
- 47 created for the wrongdoer by leaving an impression on the mind
- 48 that he has been dealt with unjustly. By pursuing a course of
- 49 exposing the wrongdoer, he may be thrown upon Satan's
- 50 battlefield and from that moment go steadily downward. Christ
- 51 bears long with us, and we must be Christlike. He does not cut us off
- because of our errors, but reproves in tenderness and draws us by
- 53 love close to Himself. {Ms43-1892.6}
- 54 If teachers see that it is impossible to bring a student under
- 55 discipline of the class, let him be removed to another class, for it
- may be that another teacher may be able to supply the deficiency.
- What one teacher lacks, another may possess; but if you can obtain
- 58 the confidence of the youth and bind him to your heart through
- 59 cords of sympathy and love, you may win a soul to Christ. The
- 60 wayward, self-willed independent boy may become transformed in
- 61 character. {Ms43-1892.7}
- 62 But while it is necessary to manifest love and sympathy for your
- 63 pupils, it is a manifest weakness to show partiality and thus
- 64 arouse suspicion and jealousy. Children are quick to discern the
- 65 preferences of the teacher, and the favored student often
- 66 measures his strength, his aptness, in skill with that of the
- 67 teacher in the management of the class. He may decide to be
- 68 master; and unless the teacher has the grace of Christ, he will
- 69 manifest weakness, become impatient, exacting, and
- 70 **severe**. {Ms43-1892.8}
- 71 The leading spirit of the class will generally impart his purpose
- 72 to other students, and there will be a combined effort to obtain
- 73 the mastery. If the teacher, through the grace of Christ, is self-
- 74 controlled and holds the lines with a steady, patient hand, he will

- 75 quell the boisterous element, keep his self-respect, and command
- 76 **the respect of his students**. When once order is restored, let
- 77 kindness, gentleness, and affection be manifested. {Ms43-1892.9}
- 78 It may be that rebellion will rise again and again, but let not the
- 79 hasty temper appear. Do not speak sharply to the evil doer, and
- 80 discourage a soul who is struggling with the power of darkness.
- 81 Be still, and let your heart ascend in prayer to God for help.
- 82 Angels will come close to your side and help you lift up the standard
- 83 against the enemy, and instead of cutting off the erring one, you may
- 84 be enabled to gain a soul for Christ. {Ms43-1892.10}
- 85 Let the teachers feel, that whatever the character of the class, they
- 86 must meet it in the spirit of Jesus. Do not meet combativeness
- 87 with combativeness. You will have to meet willfulness,
- 88 stubbornness, indolence, and frivolity; but under all emergencies
- 89 manifest kindness and love. By patience and self-control keep
- 90 your hold upon your pupils' affection, and let them have reason
- 91 to know that your whole desire is to do them good. Show your
- 92 scholars that you have confidence in them. Visit them at their
- 93 homes, and invite them to your home. Let it be seen that you
- 94 love them not only in word, but in deed and in truth. {Ms43-
- 95 1892.11}
- 96 The teacher need lay no special claims to dignity, since he can
- 97 gain the respect of his pupils in no other way than by a
- 98 Christlike deportment, in manifesting kindness and Christian
- 99 courtesy. The teacher is to educate the pupils as Christ educated
- 100 His disciples. He must make impressions that time cannot efface.
- His influence should mold his scholars after the divine Pattern, and
- if he does this, eternity alone can tell the value of his labor. The teacher must awaken in his pupils the moral nature and inspire in
- them a desire to respond to the divine agencies. {Ms43-1892.12}
- 105 Those who are selfish, peevish, dictatorial, coarse, and rough,
- 106 who do not carefully regard the feelings of others, should never
- 107 be employed as teachers. They will have a disastrous influence
- 108 upon their students, molding them after their own character,
- 109 thus perpetuating evil. Persons of this character will make an
- effort [to] break a boy's will if he is unruly, but Christ has
- authorized no such message of dealing with the erring. Through
- 112 heavenly wisdom, through meekness and lowliness of heart,
- teachers may be able to direct the will and lead in the way of
- obedience; but let no one imagine that, by threatening, the
- 115 **affection of the student may be gained**. We must work as Christ
- 116 has worked. {Ms43-1892.13}

- 117 Many underestimate the evil of an error in themselves who fully
- recognize its influence in another. On every side we meet those
- 119 who are entirely ignorant of possessing characteristics which
- need to be modified. Others can see their objectionable traits of
- character; but when they are reproved, they imagine that they
- 122 have been misjudged. The teacher should closely examine his
- own heart in the light of eternity, that he may represent before
- his pupils that which he desires them to be. He should be a daily
- learner in the school of Christ, abiding in Christ as the branch abides
- in the vine, that he may impart to others that which he has received
- 127 from Christ. {Ms43-1892.14}
- 128 The teacher who would bring his students under discipline must
- 129 himself first come under the control of Christ. Jesus has said, "He
- that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light
- of life." [John 8:12.] With divine enlightenment you can work as
- 132 Christ worked, for His light may shine through you upon the
- pathway of every impenitent transgressor with whom you are
- 134 associated. {Ms43-1892.15}
- 135 Are you indeed an instructor in the ways of God? If you are a
- converted teacher, you will be able to win, not drive, to attract,
- 137 **not repulse, the souls for whom Christ has died.** You will guard
- and care for the sheep and lambs of Christ's fold. If they stray, you
- will not leave them to perish, but will go forth to seek and to save
- 140 that which is lost. All heaven will be ready to aid you in this good
- 141 **work**. {Ms43-1892.16}
- 142 The angels will aid you in your effort to find the key to the heart
- of the most incorrigible and unruly. You will receive special
- grace and strength through Christ who is able to supply you
- from His immeasurable fullness. You will then be qualified to be
- a laborer together with God, one with Christ in your effort to save
- the lost, and your labor of love will be seen not only in time, but
- 148 through all eternity. {Ms43-1892.17}
