- O4 Some God trains by bringing to them disappointment and apparent failure. It is
- 505 His purpose that they shall learn to master difficulty. He inspires them with a
- determination to make every apparent failure prove a success.
- 507 Often men pray and weep because of the perplexities and obstacles that
- confront them. But if they will hold the beginning of their confidence steadfast
- unto the end, He will make their way clear. Success will come to them as they
- 510 struggle against apparently insurmountable difficulties; and with success will
- 511 come the greatest joy.
- Many are ignorant of how to work for God, not because they need to be
- 513 ignorant, but because they are not willing to submit to His training process.
- Moab is spoken of as a failure because, the Word declares, he "hath been at
- ease from his youth, . . . and hath not been emptied from vessel to vessel,
- 516 therefore his taste remained in him, and his scent is not changed." (Jeremiah
- 517 48:11.

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- 518 Thus it is with those whose hereditary and cultivated tendencies to wrong are
- 519 not purged from them. Their hearts are not cleansed from defilement. They
- 520 were given opportunity to do a work for God, but this work they did not
- 521 choose to do, because they wished to carry out their own plans.
- The Christian is to be prepared for the doing of a work that reveals kindness,
- 523 forbearance, longsuffering, gentleness, patience. The cultivation of these
- 524 precious gifts is to come into the discipline-life of the Christian, that when
- 525 called to service by the Master, he may be ready to exercise the energies of
- heart and mind in helping and blessing those who are ready to die.-Ms 79,

We Must Accept God's Training Experiences

"Christ has given to every man his work, and we are to acknowledge the 472 wisdom of the plan He has made for us by a hearty cooperation with Him. It is 473 in a life of service only that true happiness is found. He who lives a useless, 474 475 selfish life is miserable. He is dissatisfied with himself and with everyone else. True, unselfish, consecrated workers gladly use their highest gifts in the 476 lowliest service. They realize that true service means to see and to perform the

477 duties that God points out. 478 There are many who are not satisfied with the work that God has given them. 479

They are not satisfied to serve Him pleasantly in the place that He has marked 480 out for them, or to do uncomplainingly the work that He has placed in their 481 482 hands.

It is right for us to be dissatisfied with the way in which we perform duty, but

we are not to be dissatisfied with the duty itself, because we would rather do 484 something else. In His providence God places before human beings service 485 that will be as medicine to their diseased minds. Thus He seeks to lead them to 486 487 put aside the selfish preferences which, if cherished, would disqualify them for 488 the work He has for them. If they accept and perform this service, their minds will be cured. But if they refuse it, they will be left at strife with themselves 489 and with others. 490

The Lord disciplines His workers, so that they will be prepared to fill the 491 places appointed them. He desires to mold their minds in accordance with His 493 will. For this purpose He brings to them test and trial. Some He places where relaxed discipline and over-indulgence will not become their snare, where they 494

are taught to appreciate the value of time, and to make the best and wisest use 495

496 of it.

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There are some who desire to be a ruling power, and who need the 497 sanctification of submission. God brings about a change in their lives, and 498 perhaps places before them duties that they would not choose. If they are 499 willing to be guided by Him, He will give them grace and strength to perform 500

with success. Those who know how to pray, who know what are the invitations of the gospel of Christ, show dishonor to God when they lay their burdens upon finite men. It is always right to counsel together; it is right to converse together; it is right to make the difficulties that present themselves in any enterprise plain before your brethren and your ministers. But do not depend upon man for wisdom. Seek God for the wisdom that comes from above. Ask your fellow laborers to pray with you; and the Lord will fulfill his word, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst." — Youth Instructor, February 15, 1900 

#### We Must Accept His Direction

"It is in neglecting to follow the exact directions of the word of God that many err. They turn away from God's plans, to follow their own ideas. Christ himself declared, "The Son of Man can do nothing of himself, but what he seeth the Father do; for what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son likewise." So utterly was he emptied of self that he made no plans for himself. He accepted God's plan for him, and day by day the Father unfolded his plans. If Jesus was so wholly dependent, declaring, "I do nothing of myself," how much more should the human agents depend upon God for constant instruction, so that their lives might be the simple working out of God's will. Oh, that failing, erring mortals would be content to seek wisdom from God, and be entirely submissive in working out his directions, in exemplifying his character! If ever mortals needed to send to heaven an earnest cry, "Lord, show me thy way; teach me the way of the Lord," it is now. Only those will have a fitness for the mansions above who give to God full and implicit obedience. God knows that we would not appreciate his rarest gifts if we were not perfectly submissive to his will."—Signs of the Times, November 21, 1892 par. 2

9. When God is leading, His peace will rule in our hearts. Lack of peace is an important indicator that what we are pursuing may not be God's will, or that it is not yet God's time:

10. It is often wise to share God's leadings with a mature and surrendered Christian, to ascertain if we are correctly understanding God's leading:

### OTHER QUOTATIONS

#### God Reveals His Will Three Ways

"There are three ways in which the Lord reveals His will to us, to guide us, and to fit us to guide others. How may we know His voice from that of a stranger? How shall we distinguish it from the voice of a false shepherd? God reveals His will to us in His word, the Holy Scriptures. You are then trusting Him to work out His designs, while at the same time you are co-operating with Him by working out your own salvation with fear and trembling. You, my brother, will find difficulty here because you have not yet learned by experience to know the voice of the Good Shepherd, and this places you in doubt and peril. You ought to be able to distinguish His voice."—*Testimonies* Vol. 5, p. 512.1,2

#### You Must Trust God

"Many who profess to be Christ's followers have an anxious, troubled heart, because they are afraid to trust themselves with God. They do not make a complete surrender to Him; for they shrink from the consequences that such a surrender may involve. Unless they do make this surrender, they cannot find peace.... Obeying God Regarding Employment Contracts

"Human beings belong to the Lord, body, soul, and spirit, and they are to be guided and controlled by him. He has bought us. We are under obligation to

be laborers together with him. No one should bind himself to serve for a certain number of years in any institution.

I know that some have thought it advisable for the workers in our sanitariums to sign certain contracts. But I know also that it is not in accordance with God's plan for the workers to sign these contracts. They are pledged to God, and if he moves upon them to take the message to a certain place, shall they be bound by a pledge that hinders them from going? Never, never, We are not our own, and we are not to bind ourselves to human beings by signing contracts to do this or that. We are to work under our Master, Christ Jesus, looking to him for directions. We are to pray and work and believe, following always the course that he marks out."—Spaulding Magan Collection, p. 307.4

Be Exact In Following Divine Arrangements With Tithe

"You may say, I have not large means and can do but little with the little I have. All the Lord asks of you is to be a faithful steward, to render to God a tenth of all your increase without stopping to measure the matter to see how you are coming out. You have but little means, render back to him the portion belonging to him; for it is not yours. It is a serious matter to rob God. Thus you deprive yourself of the blessing he has promised to bestow if you exercise faithful stewardship. If you have been untrue to God, if you show that you will not do according to the agreement he has made with you, will he bless you with facilities of obtaining more means? You keep yourself under condemnation as unfaithful stewards by working contrary to a "Thus saith the Lord." You deprive the treasury of God of your proportion of his agreement with you, because you choose to walk in the light of the sparks of your own kindling. In your finite wisdom, you think you are making better terms with yourself than God has made with you. How then, if you are unfaithful steward with the least, can the Lord entrust to you larger responsibilities?

God wants all his stewards to be exact in following divine arrangements. They are not to offset the Lord's plans with some deed of charity, some gift, or some offering, done or given when and how, the human agents, shall see fit. God has made his plan known, and all who co-operate with him will carry out his plan, instead of daring to attempt to improve on it, by their own arrangements. Those who honor a "Thus saith the Lord," who accept exactly what the Lord has devised, will be according to God's plan. God will honor them, and work in their behalf: For we have his pledged word that he will open the windows of heaven and pour us out a blessing, such as there will not be room enough to receive.

It is a very poor policy for men to seek to improve on God's plan, and invent a makeshift, averaging up their good impulses in this and that instance, and offsetting them against all that is required of God. God calls upon you to give every jot of influence to his own arrangement and ordinances. We are to strike true and faithful figures in tithing and then say to the Lord, I have done as thou hast commanded me. If you will honor me by trusting me with thy goods to
