INTRODUCTION

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"The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord..."

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Learning how to determine God's will is one of the most important lessons of the Christian life. The following Scriptures and thoughts should be helpful in seeking to understand this subject.

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HUDSON TAYLOR'S EXPERIENCE FAMOUS MISSIONARY TO CHINA

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"Not many months after my conversion, having a leisure afternoon, I retired to my own chamber to spend it largely in communion with God. Well do I remember that occasion. How in the gladness of my heart I poured out my soul before God; and again and again confessing my grateful love to Him who had done everything for me-who had saved me when I had given up all hope and even desire for salvation—I besought Him to give me some work to do for Him, as an outlet for love and gratitude; some selfdenying service, no matter what it might be, however trying or however trivial: something with which He would be pleased, and that I might do for Him who had done so much for me. Well do I remember, as in unreserved consecration I put myself, my life, my friends, my all, upon the altar, the deep solemnity that came over my soul with the assurance that my offering was accepted. The presence of God became unutterably real and blessed; and though but a child under sixteen, I remember stretching myself on the ground, and lying there silent before Him with unspeakable awe and unspeakable joy.

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"For what service I was accepted I knew not; but a deep consciousness that I was no longer my own took possession of me, which has never since been effaced. It has been a very practical consciousness. Two or three years later propositions of an unusually favorable nature were made to me with regard to medical study, on the condition of my becoming apprenticed to the medical man who was my friend and teacher. But I felt I dared not accept any binding engagement such as was suggested. I was not my own to give myself away; for I knew not when or how He whose alone I was, and for whose disposal I felt I must ever keep myself free, might call for service.

"Within a few months of this time of consecration the impression was wrought into my soul that it was in China the Lord wanted me. It seemed to me highly probable that the work to which I was thus called might cost my life: for China was not then open as it is now. But few missionary societies had at that time workers in China, and but few books on the subject of China missions were accessible to me. I learned, however, that the Congregational minister of my native town possessed a copy of Medhurst's China, and I called upon him to ask a loan of the book. This he kindly granted, asking me why I wished to read it. I told him that God had called me to spend my life in missionary service in that land. "And how do you propose to go there?" he inquired. I answered that I did not at all know; that it seemed to me probable that I should need to do as the Twelve and the Seventy had done in Judea go without purse or script, relying on Him who had called me to supply all my need. Kindly placing his hand upon my shoulder, the minister replied, "Ah, my boy, as you grow older you will get wiser than that. Such an idea would do very well in the days when Christ Himself was on earth, but

 not now.

"I have grown older since then, but not wiser. I am more than ever convinced that if we were to take the directions of our Master and the assurances He gave to His first disciples more fully as our guide, we should find them to be just as suited to our times as to those in which they were originally given."—Hudson Taylor, *Retrospect*

Determining God's Will

"Many children of God are so deeply exercised on the matter of guidance that it may be helpful to give a few suggestions as to knowing the way in which our Father would have us walk, and the work He would have us do. The importance of the subject cannot be exaggerated; so much of our power and peace consists in knowing where God would have us be, and in being just there

The manna only falls where the cloudy pillar broods. If we are precisely where our heavenly Father would have us be, we can be perfectly sure He will provide food and raiment, and everything beside.

How much of our Christian work has been abortive because we have persisted in initiating it for ourselves, instead of ascertaining what God was doing and where He required of our presence? We dream bright dreams of success. We try to command it. We call to our aid all kinds of expedients, questionable or otherwise. At last we turn back, disheartened and ashamed, like children who are torn and scratched by the brambles, and soiled by the quagmire. None of this had come about if only we had been, from the first, under God's unerring guidance. He might test us, but He could not allow us to mistake.

There are certain practical directions which we must attend in order that we may be led into the mind of the Lord.

I.-Our Motives Must be Pure.

When thine eye is single, thy whole body is also full of light." (Luke 11: 34) So long as there is some thought of personal advantage, some idea of acquiring the praise and commendation of men, some aim at self-aggrandizement, it will be simply impossible to find out God's purpose concerning us.

II.-Our Will Must be Surrendered.

My judgment is just; because I seek not Mine own will, but the will of the Father which hath sent me." (John 5: 30) This was the secret which Jesus not only practiced, but taught. In one form or another He was constantly insisting on a surrendered will, as the key to perfect knowledge. "If any man will do His will, he shall know."

It is for the lack of this subordination that we so often miss the guidance we seek. There is a secret controversy between our will and God's. And we shall never be right till we have let Him take, and break, and make. Oh! Do seek for that. If you cannot give, let Him take. If you are not willing, confess that you are willing to be made willing.

III.-We Must Seek Information for our Mind.

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It is of the greatest importance that we should feed our minds with facts, with reliable information, with the results of human experience, and (above all) with the teachings of the Word of God. Notice how full the Bible is of biography and history, so that there is hardly a single crisis in our lives that may not be matched from those wondrous pages. There is no book like the Bible for casting a light on the dark landings of human life.

We have no need or right to run hither and thither to ask our friends what we ought to do; but there is no harm in our taking pains to gather all reliable information, on which the flame of holy thought and consecrated purpose may feed and grow strong. For the most part God will speak in the results of deliberate consideration, weighing and balancing the pros and cons.

IV.-We Must be Much in Prayer for Guidance.

The Psalms are full of earnest pleadings for clear direction: "Show me Thy way, Oh Lord, lead me in a plain path, because of mine enemies." It is the law of our Father's house that His children shall ask for what they want. "If any man lack wisdom, let him ask of God, who giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not."

One good form of prayer at such a juncture is to ask that doors may be shut, that the way be closed, and that all enterprises which are not according to God's will may be arrested at their very beginning. Put the matter absolutely into God's hands from the outset, and He will not fail to shatter the project and defeat the aim which is not according to His holy will.

V.-We Must Wait for the Gradual Unfolding of God's Plan in Providence.

God's impressions within and His word without are always corroborated by His Providence around, and we should quietly wait until these three focus into one point.

Sometimes it looks as if we are bound to act. Everyone says we must do something; and, indeed, things seem to have reached so desperate a pitch that we must.. Behind are the Egyptians; right and left are inaccessible precipices; before is the sea. It is not easy at such times to stand still and see the salvation of God; but we must.

Sometimes men sigh for an angel to come to point them their way; that simply indicates that as yet the time has not come for them to move. If you do not know what you ought to do, stand still until you do. And when the time comes for action, circumstances, like glowworms, will sparkle along your path; and you will become so sure that you are right, when God's three witnesses concur, that you could not be more sure though an angel beckoned you.

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We often make a great mistake, thinking that God is not guiding us at all, because we cannot see far in front. But this is not His method. He only undertakes that the steps of a good man should be ordered by the Lord. Not next year, but tomorrow. Not the next mile, but the next yard. Not the whole pattern, but the next stitch in the canvas. If you expect more than this you will be disappointed."—Adapted from F B Meyer, *Secret of Guidance*, pp 5-18

Danger of Trusting Your Own Judgment

"Never trust your own judgment. When your common sense is most sure of the rightness of a certain course of action, it will be best to make assurance doubly sure by lifting up your soul to God, that it may dim with his No, or glisten with his Yes. When voices within or without would hasten you to decide on the strength of your own conclusions, then be careful to refer the whole matter form the lower court of your own judgment to the supreme tribunal of God's. If there is any doubt or hesitation left after such reference. be sure that as yet the time has not come for you to understand all God's will. Under such circumstances-wait. There the responsibility of the pause, and all it may involve, is on God; and dare still to wait.... If you trust God absolutely, it is for him to give you clear directions as to what you should do. And when the time for action arrives, he will have given you such unmistakable indications of his will that you will not be able to mistake them or err therein. 'None of them that wait on him shall be ashamed.'

 Before entering into any alliance-taking a partner in life, going into a business with another, yielding assent to any proposition which involves confederation with others-be sure to ask counsel at the mouth of the Lord. He will assuredly answer by an irresistible impulse-by the voice of a friend; by a circumstance strange and unexpected; by a passage of Scripture. He will choose his own messenger; but he will send a message."—F B Meyer, *Joshua*, p. 118,119.

Ascertain the Will of God

"How important it is to ascertain the will of God, before we undertake anything, because we are then not only blessed in our own souls, but also the

work of our hands will prosper. Just in as many points as we are acting according to the mind of God, in so many are we blessed and made a blessing. Our manner of living is according to the mind of the Lord, for He delights in seeing His children thus come to Him (Matt. 6); and therefore, though I am weak and erring in many points, yet He blesses me in this particular.

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First of all, to see well to it, that the work in which he desires to be engaged is God's work; secondly, that he is the person to be engaged in this work; thirdly, that God's time is come, when he should do this work; and then to be assured, that, if he seeks God's help in His own appointed way, He will not fail him. We have ever found it thus, and expect to find it thus, on the ground of the promises of God, to the end of our course.

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1. Be slow to take new steps in the Lord's service, or in your business, or in your families. Weigh everything well; weigh all in the light of the Holy Scriptures, and in the fear of God.

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2. Seek to have no will of your own, in order to ascertain the mind of God, regarding any steps you propose to take, so that you can honestly say, you are willing to do the will of God, if He will only please to instruct you.

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3. But when you have found out what the will of God is, seek for His help, and seek it earnestly, perseveringly, patiently, believingly, and expectingly: and you will surely, in His own time and way, obtain it.

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388 We have not to rush forward in self-will and say, I will do the work, and I will 389 trust the Lord for means, this cannot be real trust, it is the counterfeit of faith, 390 it is presumption; and though God, in great pity and mercy, may even help us 391 finally out of debt; yet does this, on no account, prove that we were right in 392 going forward before His time was come. We ought, rather, under 393 such circumstances to say to ourselves: "Am I indeed doing the work of 394 God?" And if so, I may not be the person to do it; or if I am the person, His 395 time may not yet be come for me to go forward; it may be His good 396 pleasure to exercise my faith and patience. I ought, therefore, quietly to wait 397 His time; for when it is come, God will help. Acting on this principle 398 brings blessing. To ascertain the Lord's will we ought to use scriptural 399 means. Prayer, the word of God, and His Spirit should be united together. 400 We should go to the Lord repeatedly in prayer, and ask Him to teach us by His 401 Spirit through His word. I say by His Spirit through His word. For if 402 we should think that His Spirit led us to do so and so, because certain facts are 403 so and so, and yet His word is opposed to the step which we are going to take, 404 we should be deceiving ourselves. No situation, no business will be given to me by God, in which I have not time enough to care about my soul. Therefore, 405 406 however outward circumstances may appear, it can only be considered as

permitted of God, to prove the genuineness of my love, faith, and obedience,

but by no means as the leading of His providence to induce me to act contrary

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Get Your Heart Right

"I seek at the beginning to get my heart in such a state that it has no will of its own in regard to a given matter. Nine tenths of the trouble with people generally is just here. Nine tenths of the difficulties are overcome when our hearts are ready to do the Lord's will, whatever it may be. When one is truly in this state, it is usually but a little way to the knowledge of what His will is.

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Having done this, I do not leave the result to feeling or simple impression. If so, I make myself liable to great delusions.

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450 451 I seek the will of the Spirit of God through, or in connection with, the Word of God. The Spirit and the Word must be combined. If I look to the Spirit alone without the Word, I lay myself open to great delusions also. If the Holy Spirit guides us at all, He will do it according to the Scriptures and never contrary to them.

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Next I take into account providential circumstances. These often plainly indicate God's will in connection with His Word and Spirit.

- 491 especially at Stuttgart; and although there were many adversaries, they only
- 492 made his help the more needful to those whose spiritual welfare was in peril.
- 494 5. A distinct burden was laid on his heart, as from the Lord, which
- 495 prayer, instead of relieving, increased a burden which he felt without
- 496 being able to explain so that the determination to visit his native land gave
- 497 him a certain peace which he did not have when he thought of remaining at
- 498 home.
- 500 To avoid mistake, with equal care he records the counter-arguments.
- 502 1. The new orphan house, No. 4, was about to be opened, and his presence

was desirable if not needful.

2. A few hundred pounds were needed, to be left with his helpers, for current expenses in his absence.

3. Money was also required for traveling expenses of himself and his wife, whose health called for a change.

511 4. Funds would be needful to publish four thousand copies of his 512 Narrative and avoid too high a market price.

514 5. A matron for the new orphan house was not yet found, suitable for the position.

In this careful weighing of matters many sincere disciples fail, prone to be impatient of delay in making decisions. Impulse too often sways, and self-willed plans betray into false and even disastrous mistakes. Life is too precious to risk one such failure. There is given us a promise of deep meaning: "The meek will He guide in judgment; And the meek will He teach His way." (Psalm 25:9.) Here is a double emphasis upon meekness as a condition of such guidance and teaching. Meekness is a real preference for God's will. Where this holy habit of mind exists, the whole being becomes so open to impression that, without any outward sign or token, there is an inward recognition and choice of the will of God. God guides, not by a visible sign, but by swaying the judgment. To wait before Him, weighing candidly in the scales every consideration for or against a proposed course, and in readiness to see which way the preponderance lies, is a frame of mind and heart in which one is fitted to be guided; and God touches the scales and makes the balance to sway as He will. But our hands must be off the scales, otherwise we need expect no interposition of His in our favour.

One sure sign of this spirit of meekness is the entire restfulness with which apparent obstacles to any proposed plan or course are regarded. Then waiting and wishing only to know and do God's will, hindrances will give no anxiety, but a sort of pleasure, as affording a new opportunity for divine interposition. If it is the Pillar of God we are following, the Red Sea will not dismay us, for it will furnish but another scene for the display of the power of Him who can make the waters to stand up as an heap, and to become a wall about us as we go through the sea on dry ground.

Mr. Müller had learned this rare lesson, and in this case he says: "I had a secret satisfaction in the greatness of the difficulties which were in the way. So far from being cast down on account of them, they delighted my soul; for I only desired to do the will of the Lord in this matter." Here is revealed another secret of holy serving. To him who sets the Lord always before him, and to whom the will of God is his delight, there pertains a habit of soul, which in advance settles a thousand difficult and perplexing questions."—A.

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The Danger of Haste

"I never remember, in all my Christian course, a period now (in March 554 555 1895) of sixty-nine years and four months, that I ever sincerely and 556 patiently sought to know the will of God by the teaching of the Holy Ghost, through the instrumentality of the word of God, but I have been always 557 558 directed rightly. But if honesty of heart and uprightness before God were 559 lacking, or if I did not patiently wait upon God for instruction, or if I preferred the counsel of my fellow men to the declarations of the word of the 560 living God, I made great mistakes."—George Müller, Narratives, Vol. 3 561

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Tips on Selecting a Marriage Partner

"Let me here add a word of Christian counsel. To enter upon the 564 marriage union is one of the most deeply important events of life. It cannot 565 566 be too prayerfully treated. Our happiness, our usefulness, our living for God or for ourselves afterwards, are often most intimately connected with our choice. 567 Therefore, in the most prayerful manner, this choice should be made. Neither 568 569 beauty, nor age, nor money, nor mental powers, should be that which prompt 570 the decision: but 1st. Much waiting upon God for guidance should be used; 2nd, A hearty purpose, to be willing to be guided by Him should be 571 aimed after; 3rd, True godliness without a shadow of doubt, should be the 572. 573 first and absolutely needful qualification, to a Christian, with regard to 574 a companion for life. In addition to this, however, it ought to be, at the 575 same time, calmly and patiently weighed, whether, in other respects, there is 576 a suitableness. For instance, for an educated man to choose 577 entirely uneducated woman, is unwise; for however much on his part love might be willing to cover the defect, it will work very unhappily with regard 578 579 to the children."—George Müller, *Narratives*, Vol. 3

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The Danger of Chance Methods

George Müller used the lots three times to make decisions. Each time was a disaster. Regarding the last two times:

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"George Müller resorted to the lot only two more times: once at a literal parting of the ways when he was led by it to take the wrong fork of the road, and afterward in a far more important matter, but with a like result: in both cases he found he had been misled, and henceforth abandoned all such chance methods of determining the mind of God. He learned two lessons, which new dealings of God more and more deeply impressed:

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First, that the safe guide in every crisis is believing prayer in connection with the word of God;

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595 Secondly, that continued uncertainty as to one's course is a reason 596 for continued waiting.

These lessons should not be lightly passed over, for they are too valuable. The flesh is impatient of all delay, both in decision and action; hence all carnal choices are immature and premature, and all carnal courses are mistaken and unspiritual. God is often moved to delay that we may be led to pray, and even the answers to prayer are deferred that the natural and carnal spirit may be kept in check and self-will may bow before the will of God."—George Müller, quoted in *George Müller of Bristol* by A. T. Pierson

Discovering God's Will

620 "This unreserved surrender to obey, as it is the first condition of 621 entering Christ's school, is the only fitness for receiving instruction as to the 622 will of God for us.

There is a general will of God for all His children, which we can, in some measure, learn out of the Bible. But there is a special individual application of these commands-God's will concerning each of us personally, which only the Holy Spirit can teach. And He will not teach it, except to those who have taken the vow of obedience.

This is the reason why there are so many unanswered prayers for God to make known His will. Jesus said, 'If any man wills to do His Will, he shall know of the teaching, whether it be of God.' If a man's will is really set on doing God's will, that is, if his heart is given up to do, and he as a consequence does it as far as he knows it, he shall know what God has further to teach him.

It is simply what is true of every scholar with the art he studies, of every apprentice with his trade, of every man in business doing is the one condition of truly knowing. And so obedience, the doing of God's will as far as we know, and the will and the vow to do it all as He reveals it, is the spiritual organ, the capacity for receiving the true knowledge of what is God's will for each of us.

In connection with this let me press upon you three things.

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645 1. Seek to have a deep sense of your very great ignorance of God's will, and
646 of your impotence by any effort to know it aright.

The consciousness of ignorance lies at the root of true teachableness. 'The meek will He guide in the way' -those who humbly confess their need of teaching. Head-knowledge only gives human thoughts without power. God by His Spirit gives a living knowledge that enters the love of the heart, and works effectually.

2. Cultivate a strong faith that God will make you know wisdom in the hidden part, in the heart.

 You may have known so little of this in your Christian life hitherto that the thought appears strange. Learn that God's working, the place where He gives His life and light, is in the heart, deeper than all our thoughts. Any uncertainty about God's will makes a joyful obedience impossible. Believe most confidently that the Father is willing to make known what He wants you to do. Count upon Him for this. Expect it certainly.

3. In view of the darkness and deceitfulness of the flesh and fleshly mind, ask God very earnestly for the searching and convincing light of the Holy Spirit.

There may be many things which you have been accustomed to think lawful or allowable, which your Father wants different. To consider it settled that they are the will of God because others and you think so, may effectually shut you out from knowing God's will in other things. Bring everything, without reserve, to the judgment of the Word, explained and applied by the Holy Spirit. Wait on God to lead you to know that everything you are and do is pleasing in His sight."—Andrew Murray, *School of Obedience*, pp. 96-98.

Take No Step Without God's Guidance

"One great law for all who would be truly led by God's Pillar of cloud and fire, is to take no step at the bidding of self-will or without the clear moving of the heavenly Guide. Though the direction be new and the way seem beset with difficulty, there is never any risk, provided we are only led of God. If the work is His work, let Him control it, and, whether we expand or contract, let it be at His bidding, and a matter of equal satisfaction to His servant."—A. T. God's Direction Will be in Harmony

"There is a way out of all these difficulties to the fully surrendered soul. I would repeat fully surrendered, because, if there is any reserve of will upon any point, it becomes almost impossible to find out the mind of God in reference to that point; and therefore the first thing is to be sure that you really do purpose to obey the Lord in every respect.

Settle this point then, first of all, and let no suggestion of doubt turn you from a steadfast faith in regard to it, that Divine guidance has been promised, and that, if you seek it, you are sure to receive it.

There are four ways in which He reveals His will to us,-through the Scriptures, through providential circumstances, through the convictions of our own higher judgment, and through the inward impressions of the Holy Spirit on our minds. Where these four harmonize, it is safe to say that God speaks. For I lay it down as a foundation principle, which no one can gainsay, that of course the "voice" of His will shall always be in harmony with itself, no matter in how many different ways He may speak. The voices may be many, the message can be but one.

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The Scriptures come first. If you are in doubt upon any subject, you must, first of all, consult the Bible about it, and see whether there is any law there to direct you. Until you have found and obeyed God's will as it is there revealed, you must not ask nor expect a separate, direct, personal revelation.

If, however, upon searching the Bible you do not find any principles that will settle your especial point of difficulty, you must then seek guidance in the other ways mentioned; and God will surely voice Himself to you, either by a conviction of your judgment, or by providential circumstances, or by a clear inward impression. In all true guidance these four voices will, as I have said, necessarily harmonize, for God cannot say in one voice that which He contradicts in another.

The third test to which our impressions must be brought is that of providential circumstances. If a "leading" is of God, the way will always open for it. It is

never a sign of a Divine leading when the Christian insists on opening his own way, and riding roughshod over all opposing things.

The fourth point I would make is this, that just as our impressions must be tested, as I have shown, by the other three voices, so these other voices must be tested by our inward impressions; and if we feel a "stop" in our minds about anything, we must wait until that is removed before acting.

It sometimes happens, however, that in spite of all our efforts to discover the truth, the divine sense of "oughtness" does not seem to come, and our doubts and perplexities continue unenlightened. Our friends differ from us, and would, we know, oppose our course. In such a case there is nothing to do but to wait until the light comes. But we must wait in faith and in an attitude of entire surrender, saying a continual "yes" to the will of our Lord, let it be what it may. If the suggestion is from Him, it will continue and strengthen; if it is not from Him, it will disappear, and we shall almost forget we ever had it. If it continues, if every time we are brought into communion with the Lord it seems to return, if it troubles us in our moments of prayer and disturbs all our peace, and if finally it conforms to the test of the divine harmony of which I have spoken, we may then feel sure it is from God, and we must yield to it, or suffer an unspeakable loss."—Adapted from Hannah Whital Smith's *The Secret of a Happy Christian's Life*, pp 66-73.

God Reveals His Will Three Ways

"There are three ways in which the Lord reveals His will to us, to guide us, and to fit us to guide others. How may we know His voice from that of a stranger? How shall we distinguish it from the voice of a false shepherd? God reveals His will to us in His word, the Holy Scriptures. His voice is also revealed in His providential workings; and it will be recognized if we do not separate our souls from Him by walking in our own ways, doing according to our own wills, and following the promptings of an unsanctified heart, until the senses have become so confused that eternal things are not discerned, and the voice of Satan is so disguised that it is accepted as the voice of God.

784 Another way in which God's voice is heard is through the appeals of His Holy 785 Spirit, making impressions upon the heart, which will be wrought out in the 786 character. If you are in doubt upon any subject you must first consult the 787 Scriptures. If you have truly begun the life of faith you have given yourself to the Lord to be wholly His, and He has taken you to mold and fashion 788 789 according to His purpose, that you may be a vessel unto honor. You should 790 have an earnest desire to be pliable in His hands and to follow whithersoever 791 He may lead you. You are then trusting Him to work out His designs, while at 792 the same time you are co-operating with Him by working out your own 793 salvation with fear and trembling. You, my brother, will find difficulty here 794 because you have not yet learned by experience to know the voice of the Good 795 Shepherd, and this places you in doubt and peril. 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998 I know that some have thought it advisable for the workers in our sanitariums 999 to sign certain contracts. But I know also that it is not in accordance with 1000 God's plan for the workers to sign these contracts. They are pledged to God, 1001 and if he moves upon them to take the message to a certain place, shall they be 1002 bound by a pledge that hinders them from going? Never, never, We are not 1003 our own, and we are not to bind ourselves to human beings by signing 1004 contracts to do this or that. We are to work under our Master. Christ Jesus. 1005 looking to him for directions. We are to pray and work and believe, following 1006 always the course that he marks out."—Spaulding Magan Collection, p. 307.4

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Be Exact In Following God's Injunctions On Tithe

1009 "You may say, I have not large means and can do but little with the little I 1010 have. All the Lord asks of you is to be a faithful steward, to render to God a 1011 tenth of all your increase without stopping to measure the matter to see how 1012 you are coming out. You have but little means, render back to him the portion 1013 belonging to him; for it is not yours. It is a serious matter to rob God. Thus 1014 you deprive yourself of the blessing he has promised to bestow if you exercise faithful stewardship. If you have been untrue to God, if you show that you will 1015 1016 not do according to the agreement he has made with you, will he bless you 1017 with facilities of obtaining more means? You keep yourself under

1018 condemnation as unfaithful stewards by working contrary to a "Thus saith the

1019 Lord." You deprive the treasury of God of your proportion of his agreement 1020 with you, because you choose to walk in the light of the sparks of your own 1021 kindling. In your finite wisdom, you think you are making better terms with 1022 yourself than God has made with you. How then, if you are unfaithful steward 1023 with the least, can the Lord entrust to you larger responsibilities?

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1025 God wants all his stewards to be exact in following divine arrangements. They 1026 are not to offset the Lord's plans with some deed of charity, some gift, or some 1027 offering, done or given when and how, the human agents, shall see fit. God 1028 has made his plan known, and all who co-operate with him will carry out his 1029 plan, instead of daring to attempt to improve on it, by their own arrangements. 1030 Those who honor a "Thus saith the Lord," who accept exactly what the Lord 1031 has devised, will be according to God's plan. God will honor them, and work 1032 in their behalf: For we have his pledged word that he will open the windows 1033 of heaven and pour us out a blessing, such as there will not be room enough to 1034 receive.

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It is a very poor policy for men to seek to improve on God's plan, and invent a makeshift, averaging up their good impulses in this and that instance, and offsetting them against all that is required of God. God calls upon you to give every jot of influence to his own arrangement and ordinances. We are to strike true and faithful figures in tithing and then say to the Lord. I have done as thou hast commanded me. If you will honor me by trusting me with thy goods to trade upon, I will be thy faithful steward, doing all in my power to bring meat to thy house, and I will seek to instruct others how to work in the same lines."—Kress Collection, p. 156.1,2

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Tips on Selecting a Marriage Partner

1046 1047 "If men and women are in the habit of praying twice a day before 1048 they contemplate marriage, they should pray four times a day when such 1049 a step is anticipated. He seeks to encourage a sense of personal dependence, and to increase the need of personal guidance. His gifts are committed to men as individuals. Every man has been made a steward of sacred trusts; each is to discharge his trust, according to the direction of the Giver; and by each an account of his stewardship must be rendered to God."—Loma Linda Messages, p. 257.5

"I am bidden to say that the work of following the guidance and direction of men is a mistake, from beginning to end. God now calls for genuine conversion on the part of those who have taken up the work of telling other men just where they shall go and how they shall labor. No man has been delegated by God to act as a dictator to his fellow-laborers, telling them what is their duty; for this is assuming by weak and erring man that which belongs to God alone. Our brethren should refuse to accept such responsibility; for by 1113 taking such a course they are teaching men to seek the direction and guidance 1114 of man instead of the control and guidance of God. ... One great object in the 1115 mission of Christ was to establish in every believer a sense of the guiding and 1116 controlling power of God. This lesson is to be repeated again and again. No 1117 greater injury can be done to our churches than for members to be taught to 1118 look to their fellowmen for guidance. And there is no man so humble in heart 1119 and so respectful of his brethren that he can safely take upon himself this 1120 work."—Loma Linda Messages, p. 212 (italics supplied)

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1122 "Never should a worker encourage one who is in need of instruction and help 1123 to go first to human agencies for an understanding of his duty. It is our 1124 privilege as laborers to pray together and to counsel together; but we are 1125 individually to seek God to know what he would have us do. When the Lord 1126 impresses the mind of one of his servants that he is to go to a certain place to 1127 labor, that man is not under obligation to go to a human being to know if it is 1128 right for him to do this. It is a wrong education to teach our people to lean on 1129 human aids, instead of going to the Lord in prayer. The enemy of souls has 1130 been the instigator of this, that minds might become obscured. The people are 1131 not to be instructed differently. God's people are to meet together in counsel, 1132 but no leader or worker is to take the position that God's children are to make 1133 no move until he is first consulted. Those who bear responsibilities in the 1134 work are to co-operate with heavenly angels in teaching men and women to 1135 look to God as the source of their strength."—Spaulding and Magan 1136 Collection, p. 415

- 1138 "God would have you united in pleasant cords of companionship. As the 1139 Lord's workmen, you are to open your plans one to another. These plans must 1140 be carefully and prayerfully considered, for the Lord will leave those who do 1141 not do this to stumble in their own supposed wisdom and superior greatness.
- 1142 [John 15:16, 17, quoted.]
- 1143 One person must not suppose that his wisdom is beyond making any mistake.
- 1144 God would have the greatest cherish that humility that will lead him to be the
- 1145 servant of all if duty thus orders it.
- 1146 But while you are to love as brethren, and think soul to soul, heart to heart, life
- 1147 to life, you are individually to lean your whole weight on God. He will be in 1148
- your support. He is not pleased when you depend on each other for light and 1149 wisdom and direction. The Lord must be our wisdom. Individually we must
- know that He is our sanctification and our redemption. To Him we may look, 1150
- 1151 in Him we may trust. He will be to us a present help in every time of need."—

1154 "In the place of bearing your perplexities to a brother or a minister, take them 1155 to the Lord in prayer. Do not place the minister where God should be. The 1156 minister of Christ is like other men. True, he bears sacred responsibilities, but 1157 he is not infallible. He is compassed with infirmity, and needs grace and 1158 divine enlightenment. He needs the heavenly unction, in order to do his work 1159 with success. Those who know how to pray, who know what are the 1160 invitations of the gospel of Christ, show dishonor to God when they lay their 1161 burdens upon finite men. It is always right to counsel together; it is right to 1162 converse together; it is right to make the difficulties that present themselves in 1163 any enterprise plain before your brethren and your ministers. But do not 1164 depend upon man for wisdom. Seek God for the wisdom that comes from 1165 above. Ask your fellow laborers to pray with you; and the Lord will fulfill his 1166 word, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the 1167 midst." — Youth Instructor, February 15, 1900

We Must Accept His Direction

1170 "It is in neglecting to follow the exact directions of the word of God that many err. They turn away from God's plans, to follow their own ideas. Christ 1171 1172 himself declared, "The Son of Man can do nothing of himself, but what he 1173 seeth the Father do; for what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son 1174 likewise." So utterly was he emptied of self that he made no plans for himself. 1175 He accepted God's plan for him, and day by day the Father unfolded his plans. 1176 If Jesus was so wholly dependent, declaring, "I do nothing of myself," how 1177 much more should the human agents depend upon God for constant 1178 instruction, so that their lives might be the simple working out of God's will. 1179 Oh, that failing, erring mortals would be content to seek wisdom from God, 1180 and be entirely submissive in working out his directions, in exemplifying his 1181 character! ... Only those will have a fitness for the mansions above who give 1182 to God full and implicit obedience. God knows that we would not appreciate 1183 his rarest gifts if we were not perfectly submissive to his will."—Signs of the 1184 Times, November 21, 1892 par. 2

1186 "We must not study to have our own way, but God's way and God's will. . . . 1187 Human beings suffer much because they step out of the path that God has 1188 chosen for them to follow. They walk in the sparks of the fire they themselves 1189 have kindled, and the sure result is affliction, unrest, and sorrow, which they 1190 might have avoided if they had submitted their will to God. . . . Whatever path 1191 God chooses for us, whatever way He ordains for our feet, that is the only path 1192 of safety. . . . With the eye of faith, with childlike submission as obedient 1193 children, we must look to God, to follow His guidance, and difficulties will 1194 clear away. The promise is, "I will instruct thee and teach thee."—Sons and 1195 Daughters of God, p. 175.5

"When the students in our schools shall learn to like God's will, they will find it comparatively easy to do it."—Fundamentals of Christian Education, p. 293.2

"All who have determined to serve God will seek to know and to do his will, at whatever cost to themselves. The true servants of God will be made manifest by their willing obedience to all the commandments of their Master. They will not be murmuring and finding fault with the law, but will declare by word and action, "This is the love of God, that we keep his commandments; and his commandments are not grievous." In obeying the law, they are doing

- 1207 that which is well-pleasing in the sight of Heaven, and all the promises of the
- 1208 word of God are pledged to the support of the faithful and obedient. They may
- 1209 hope in his mercy, build on his immutable counsels, obtain the desires of their
- hearts, because their wills are placed on the side of God's will. It is their meat
- 1211 to do the will of God and to finish his work. The gates of the eternal city shall
- 1212 open for the nation that has kept the truth. The servants of God shall eat of the
- 1213 tree of life, and enjoy the unsearchable riches of eternity."—Signs of the
- 1214 *Times*, January 6, 1888 par 5
- 1215
- 1216 We Must Accept God's Training Experiences
- 1217 "Christ has given to every man his work, and we are to acknowledge the
- wisdom of the plan He has made for us by a hearty cooperation with Him. It is in a life of service only that true happiness is found. He who lives a useless,
- selfish life is miserable. He is dissatisfied with himself and with everyone
- 1221 else.
- 1222 True, unselfish, consecrated workers gladly use their highest gifts in the
- 1223 lowliest service. They realize that true service means to see and to perform the
- 1224 duties that God points out.
- There are many who are not satisfied with the work that God has given them.
- 1226 They are not satisfied to serve Him pleasantly in the place that He has marked
- 1227 out for them, or to do uncomplainingly the work that He has placed in their
- 1228 hands.
- 1229 It is right for us to be dissatisfied with the way in which we perform duty, but
- we are not to be dissatisfied with the duty itself, because we would rather do
- 1231 something else. In His providence God places before human beings service
- that will be as medicine to their diseased minds. Thus He seeks to lead them to
- 1233 put aside the selfish preferences which, if cherished, would disqualify them
- 1234 for the work He has for them. If they accept and perform this service, their
- 1235 minds will be cured. But if they refuse it, they will be left at strife with
- themselves and with others.
- 1237 The Lord disciplines His workers, so that they will be prepared to fill the
- 1238 places appointed them. He desires to mold their minds in accordance with His
- 1239 will. For this purpose He brings to them test and trial. Some He places where
- 1240 relaxed discipline and over-indulgence will not become their snare, where
- 1241 they are taught to appreciate the value of time, and to make the best and wisest
- 1242 use of it.
- 1243 There are some who desire to be a ruling power, and who need the
- 1244 sanctification of submission. God brings about a change in their lives, and
- 1245 perhaps places before them duties that they would not choose. If they are
- 1246 willing to be guided by Him, He will give them grace and strength to perform
- 1247 the objectionable duties in a spirit of submission and helpfulness. They are
- 1248 being qualified to fill places where their disciplined abilities will make them
- of the greatest service.
- 1250 Some God trains by bringing to them disappointment and apparent failure. It
- 1251 is His purpose that they shall learn to master difficulty. He inspires them with
- 1252 a determination to make every apparent failure prove a success.

- 1253 Often men pray and weep because of the perplexities and obstacles that
- 1254 confront them. But if they will hold the beginning of their confidence steadfast
- unto the end, He will make their way clear. Success will come to them as they
- 1256 struggle against apparently insurmountable difficulties; and with success will
- 1257 come the greatest joy.
- 1258 Many are ignorant of how to work for God, not because they need to be
- 1259 ignorant, but because they are not willing to submit to His training process.
- 1260 Moab is spoken of as a failure because, the Word declares, he "hath been at
- 1261 ease from his youth, . . . and hath not been emptied from vessel to vessel,
- 1262 therefore his taste remained in him, and his scent is not changed." (Jeremiah
- 1263 48:11.)
- 1264 Thus it is with those whose hereditary and cultivated tendencies to wrong are
- 1265 not purged from them. Their hearts are not cleansed from defilement. They
- 1266 were given opportunity to do a work for God, but this work they did not
- 1267 choose to do, because they wished to carry out their own plans.
- 1268 The Christian is to be prepared for the doing of a work that reveals kindness,
- 1269 forbearance, longsuffering, gentleness, patience. The cultivation of these
- 1270 precious gifts is to come into the discipline-life of the Christian, that when
- 1271 called to service by the Master, he may be ready to exercise the energies of
- 1272 heart and mind in helping and blessing those who are ready to die.-Ms 79,
