Ellen G. White Doing For Christ

- 1 Chapter 2—Doing for Christ
- 2 From what has been shown me, Sabbathkeepers are growing more selfish as
- 3 they increase in riches. Their love for Christ and His people is decreasing.
- 4 They do not see the wants of the needy, nor feel their sufferings and sorrows.
- 5 They do not realize that in neglecting the poor and the suffering they neglect
- 6 Christ, and that in relieving the wants and sufferings of the poor as far as
- 7 possible, they minister to Jesus. {2T 24.1}
- 8 Christ says to His redeemed people: "Come, ye blessed of My Father, inherit
- 9 the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: for I was an
- 10 hungered, and ye gave Me meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave Me drink; I was a
- 11 stranger, and ye took Me in: naked, and ye clothed Me: I was sick, and ye
- 12 visited Me: I was in prison, and ye came unto Me. {2T 24.2}
- 13 "Then shall the righteous answer Him, saying, Lord, when saw we Thee an
- 14 hungered, and fed Thee? or thirsty, and gave Thee drink? When saw we Thee a
- 15 stranger, and took Thee in? or naked, and clothed Thee? Or when saw we Thee
- 16 sick, or in prison, and came unto Thee? And the King shall answer and say
- 17 unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the
- 18 least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me." {2T 24.3}
- 19 To become a toiler, to continue patiently in well-doing which calls for self-
- 20 denying labor, is a glorious work, which Heaven smiles upon. Faithful
- 21 work is more acceptable to God than the most zealous and thought-to-be
- 22 holiest worship. It is working together with Christ that is true worship.
- 23 Prayers, exhortation, and talk are cheap fruits, which are frequently tied
- 24 on; but fruits that are manifested in good works, in caring for the needy,
- 25 the fatherless, and widows, are genuine fruits, and grow naturally upon a
- 26 **good tree**. {2T 24.4}
- 27 Pure religion and undefiled before the Father is this: "To visit the fatherless and
- 28 widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world."
- 29 Good deeds are the fruit that Christ requires us to bear: kind words, deeds
- 30 of benevolence, of tender regard for the poor, the needy, the afflicted.
- 31 When hearts sympathize with hearts burdened with discouragement and
- 32 grief, when the hand dispenses to the needy, when the naked are clothed,
- 33 the stranger made welcome to a seat in your parlor and a place in your
- 34 heart, angels are coming very near, and an answering strain is responded
- 35 to in heaven. Every act of justice, mercy, and benevolence makes melody in
- 36 heaven. The Father from His throne beholds those who do these acts of mercy,
- 37 and numbers them with His most precious treasures. "And they shall be Mine,
- 38 saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up My jewels." Every
- 39 merciful act to the needy, the suffering, is regarded as though done to
- 40 Jesus. When you succor the poor, sympathize with the afflicted and oppressed,
- 41 and befriend the orphan, you bring yourselves into a closer relationship to

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42 Jesus. {2T 25.1}
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- 43 "Then shall He say also unto them on the left hand, Depart from Me, ye cursed,
- 44 into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels: for I was an
- 45 hungered, and ye gave Me no meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave Me no drink: I
- 46 was a stranger, and ye took Me not in: naked, and ye clothed Me not: sick, and
- 47 in prison, and ye visited Me not. Then shall they also answer Him, saying,
- 48 Lord, when saw we Thee an hungered, or athirst, or a stranger, or naked, or
- 49 sick, or in prison, and did not minister unto Thee? Then shall He answer them,
- 50 saying, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of
- 51 these, ye did it not to Me. And these shall go away into everlasting punishment:
- 52 but the righteous into life eternal." Matthew 25:41-46. {2T 25.2}
- 53 Jesus here identifies Himself with His suffering people. It was I who was
- 54 hungry and thirsty. It was I who was a stranger. It was I who was naked.
- 55 It was I who was sick. It was I who was in prison. When you were enjoying
- 56 the food from your bountifully spread tables, I was famishing in the hovel
- 57 or street not far from you. When you closed your doors against Me, while
- 58 your well-furnished rooms were unoccupied, I had not where to lay My
- 59 head. Your wardrobes were filled with an abundant supply of changeable
- 60 suits of apparel, upon which means had been needlessly squandered,
- 61 which you might have given to the needy. I was destitute of comfortable
- 62 apparel. When you were enjoying health, I was sick. Misfortune cast Me
- 63 into prison and bound Me with fetters, bowing down My spirit, depriving
- 64 Me of freedom and hope, while you roamed free. What a oneness Jesus
- 65 here expresses as existing between Himself and His suffering disciples! He
- 66 makes their case His own. He identifies Himself as being in person the very
- 67 sufferer. Mark, selfish Christian: every neglect of the needy poor, the
- 68 orphan, the fatherless, is a neglect of Jesus in their person. {2T 25.3}
- 69 I am acquainted with persons who make a high profession, whose hearts are so
- 70 encased in self-love and selfishness that they cannot appreciate what I am
- 71 writing. They have all their lives thought and lived only for self. To make a
- 72 sacrifice to do others good, to disadvantage themselves to advantage
- 73 others, is out of the question with them. They have not the least idea that
- 74 God requires this of them. Self is their idol. Precious weeks, months, and
- 75 years pass into eternity, but they have no record in heaven of kindly acts, of
- 76 sacrificing for others' good, of feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, or
- 77 taking in the stranger. This entertaining strangers at a venture is not
- 78 agreeable. If they knew that all who sought to share their bounty were
- 79 worthy, then they might be induced to do something in this direction. But
- 80 there is virtue in venturing something. Perchance we may entertain angels. {2T
- 81 26.1}
- 82 There are orphans that should be cared for; but some will not venture to
- 83 undertake this, for it would bring them more work than they care to do,
- 84 leaving them but little time to please themselves. But when the King shall
- 85 make investigation, these do-nothing, illiberal, selfish souls will learn that
- 86 heaven is for those who have been workers, those who have denied
- 87 themselves for Christ's sake. No provisions have been made for those who
- 88 have ever taken such special care in loving and looking out for themselves.
- 89 The terrible punishment which the King threatens those on His left hand, in this
- 90 case, is not because of their great crimes. They are not condemned for the

- 91 things which they did do, but for that which they did not do. You did not
- 92 those things which Heaven assigned you to do. You pleased yourself, and can
- 93 take your portion with self-pleasers. {2T 27.1}
- 94 To my sisters I would say: Be daughters of benevolence. The Son of man came
- 95 to seek and to save that which was lost. You may have thought that if you
- 96 could find a child without fault, you would take it, and care for it; but to
- 97 perplex your mind with an erring child, to unlearn it many things and
- 98 teach it anew, to teach it self-control, is a work which you refuse to
- 99 undertake. To teach the ignorant, to pity and to reform those who have
- 100 ever been learning evil, is no slight task; but Heaven has placed just such
- 101 ones in your way. They are blessings in disguise. {2T 27.2}
- 102 Years ago I was shown that God's people would be tested upon this point of
- 103 making homes for the homeless; that there would be many without homes in
- 104 consequence of their believing the truth. Opposition and persecution would
- 105 deprive believers of their homes, and it was the duty of those who had homes
- 106 to open a wide door to those who had not. I have been shown more recently
- 107 that God would specially test His professed people in reference to this matter.
- 108 Christ for our sakes became poor that we through His poverty might be made
- 109 rich. He made a sacrifice that He might provide a home for pilgrims and
- 110 strangers in the world seeking for a better country, even an heavenly. Shall
- 111 those who are subjects of His grace, who are expecting to be heirs of
- 112 immortality, refuse, or even feel reluctant, to share their homes with the
- 113 homeless and needy? Shall we, who are disciples of Jesus, refuse strangers an
- 114 entrance to our doors because they can claim no acquaintance with the
- 115 inmates? {2T 27.3}
- 116 Has the injunction of the apostle no force in this age: "Be not forgetful to
- 117 entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares"? I am
- 118 daily pained with exhibitions of selfishness among our people. There is an
- 119 alarming absence of love and care for those who are entitled to it. Our
- 120 heavenly Father lays blessings disguised in our pathway, but some will not
- 121 touch these for fear they will detract from their enjoyment. Angels are
- 122 waiting to see if we embrace opportunities within our reach of doing good—
- 123 waiting to see if we will bless others, that they in their turn may bless us. The
- 124 Lord Himself has made us to differ,—some poor, some rich, some
- 125 afflicted,—that all may have an opportunity to develop character. The
- 126 poor are purposely permitted to be thus of God, that we may be tested and
- 127 proved, and develop what is in our hearts. {2T 28.1}
- 128 I have heard many excuse themselves from inviting to their homes and
- 129 hearts the saints of God. "Why, I have nothing prepared, I have nothing
- 130 cooked; they must go to some other place." And at that place there may be
- 131 some other excuse invented for not receiving those who need hospitality,
- 132 and the feelings of the visitors are deeply grieved, and they leave with
- 133 **unpleasant impressions** in regard to the hospitality of these professed brethren
- 134 and sisters. If you have no bread, sister, imitate the case brought to view in
- 135 the Bible. Go to your neighbor and say: "Friend, lend me three loaves; for
- 136 a friend of mine in his journey is come to me, and I have nothing to set
- 137 before him." We have not an example of this lack of bread ever being made an
- 138 excuse to refuse entrance to an applicant. When Elijah came to the widow of
- 139 Sarepta, she shared her morsel with the prophet of God, and he wrought a

- 140 miracle, and caused that in that act of making a home for his servant, and
- 141 sharing her morsel with him, she herself was sustained, and her life and that of
- 142 her son preserved. Thus will it prove in the case of many, if they do this
- 143 cheerfully, for the glory of God. {2T 28.2}
- 144 Some plead their poor health—they would love to do if they had strength.
- 145 Such have so long shut themselves up to themselves, and thought so much
- 146 of their own poor feelings, and talked so much of their sufferings, trials,
- 147 and afflictions, that it is their present truth. They can think of no one but
- 148 self, however much others may be in need of sympathy and assistance. You
- 149 who are suffering with poor health, there is a remedy for you. If thou
- 150 clothe the naked, and bring the poor that are cast out to thy house, and
- 151 deal thy bread to the hungry, "then shall thy light break forth as the
- 152 morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily." Doing good is an
- 153 excellent remedy for disease. Those who engage in the work are invited to
- 154 call upon God, and He has pledged Himself to answer them. Their soul shall
- 155 be satisfied in drought, and they shall be like a watered garden, whose waters
- 156 fail not. {2T 29.1}
- 157 Wake up, brethren and sisters. Do not be afraid of good works. "Let us not be
- 158 weary in well-doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." **Do not**
- 159 wait to be told your duty. Open your eyes and see who are around you;
- 160 make yourselves acquainted with the helpless, afflicted, and needy. Hide
- 161 not yourselves from them, and seek not to shut out their needs. Who gives
- 162 the proofs mentioned in James, of possessing pure religion, untainted with
- selfishness or corruption? Who are anxious to do all in their power to aid in the
- 164 great plan of salvation? {2T 29.2}
- 165 I am acquainted with a widow who has two small children to support, wholly
- 166 by the use of her needle. She looks pale and careworn. All through the hard
- 167 winter she has struggled to sustain herself and her children. She has received a
- 168 little help, but who would feel any lack if a still greater interest were
- 169 manifested in this case? Here are her two boys, aged about nine and eleven
- 170 years, who need homes. Who are willing to give them homes for Christ's sake?
- 171 The mother should be released from this care and close confinement to her
- 172 **needle**. These boys are in a village, their only guardian their hard-working
- 173 mother. They need to be taught how to work as their age will admit. *They need*
- 174 to be patiently, kindly, lovingly instructed. Some may say: "Oh, yes, I would
- 175 take them and teach them how to work." But they should not lose sight of
- 176 other things which these children need besides being taught to work. They
- 177 need to be instructed how they shall develop good Christian character. They
- 178 want love and affection, they need to be fitted to become useful here, and
- 179 *finally to be prepared for heaven*. Disrobe yourselves of selfishness, and see if
- 180 there are not many whom you can help and bless with your homes, your
- 181 sympathy, your love, and in pointing them to the Lamb of God, who taketh
- 182 away the sins of the world. Do you wish to make any sacrifice to save souls?
- 183 Jesus, the dear Saviour, is preparing a home for you; and why will not you
- 184 in your turn prepare a home for those who need it, and in thus doing
- 185 imitate the example of your Master? If you are not willing to do this, when
- 186 you shall feel that you need a habitation in the heavens, none will be
- 187 awarded you. For Christ declares: "Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the
- least of these, ye did it not to Me." You that have been selfish, studying your

- 189 own ease and advantage all your life, your hours of probation are fast closing.
- 190 What are you doing to redeem your life of selfishness and uselessness? Wake
- 191 up! wake up! {2T 30.1}
- 192 As you regard your eternal interest, arouse yourselves, and begin to sow good
- 193 seed. That which you sow, you shall also reap. The harvest is coming—the
- 194 great reaping time, when we shall reap what we have sown. There will be no
- 195 failure in the crop; the harvest is sure. Now is the sowing time. Now make
- 196 efforts to be rich in good works, "ready to distribute, willing to communicate,"
- 197 laying up in store for yourselves a good foundation against the time to come,
- 198 that ye "may lay hold on eternal life." I implore you, my brethren in every
- 199 place, rid yourselves of your icy coldness. Encourage in yourselves a love of
- 200 hospitality, a love to help those who need help. {2T 31.1}
- 201 You may say you have been taken in and have bestowed your means upon
- 202 those unworthy of your charity, and therefore have become discouraged in
- 203 trying to help the needy. I present Jesus before you. He came to save fallen
- 204 man, to bring salvation to His own nation; but they would not accept Him.
- 205 They treated His mercy with insult and contempt, and at length they put
- 206 to death Him who came for the purpose of giving them life. Did our Lord
- 207 turn from the fallen race because of this? Though your efforts for good
- 208 have been unsuccessful ninety-nine times, and you received only insult,
- 209 reproach, and hate, yet if the one-hundredth time proves a success, and one
- 210 soul is saved, oh, what a victory is achieved! One soul wrenched from Satan's
- 211 grasp, one soul benefited, one soul encouraged. This will a thousand times
- 212 repay you for all your efforts. To you will Jesus say: "Inasmuch as ye have
- 213 done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."
- 214 Should we not gladly do all we can to imitate the life of our divine Lord? Many
- 215 shrink at the idea of making any sacrifice for others' good. They are not willing
- 216 to suffer for the sake of helping others. They flatter themselves that it is not
- 217 required of them to disadvantage themselves for the benefit of others. To such
- 218 we say: Jesus is our example. {2T 31.2}
- 219 When the request was made for the two sons of Zebedee to sit the one on His
- 220 right hand and the other on His left in His kingdom, Jesus answered: "Ye know
- 221 not what ye ask. Are ye able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of, and to be
- 222 baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with? They say unto Him, We are
- 223 able. And He saith unto them, Ye shall drink indeed of My cup, and be
- 224 baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with: but to sit on My right hand,
- 225 and on My left, is not Mine to give, but it shall be given to them for whom it is
- 226 prepared of My Father." How many can answer: We can drink of the cup; we
- 227 can be baptized with the baptism; and make the answer understandingly? How
- 228 many imitate the great Exemplar? All who have professed to be followers of
- 229 Christ have, in taking this step, pledged themselves to walk even as He walked.
- 230 Yet the course of many who make high professions of the truth shows that they
- 231 make but little reference to the Pattern in conforming their lives thereto. They
- 232 shape their course to meet their own imperfect standard. They do not imitate
- 233 the self-denial of Christ or His life of sacrifice for others' good. {2T 32.1}
- 234 The poor, the homeless, and the widows are among us. I heard a wealthy
- 235 farmer describe the situation of a poor widow among them. He lamented her
- 236 straitened circumstances, and then said: "I don't know how she is going to get
- 237 along this cold winter. She has close times now." Such have forgotten the

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238 pattern, and by their acts say: "Nay, Lord, we cannot drink of the cup of self-
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- 239 denial, humiliation, and sacrifice which You drank of, nor be baptized with the
- 240 suffering which You were baptized with. We cannot live to do others good. It is
- 241 our business to take care of ourselves." Who should know how the widow
- 242 should get along unless it be those who have well-filled granaries? The means
- 243 for her to get along are at hand. And dare those whom God has made His
- 244 stewards, to whom He has entrusted means, withhold from the needy
- 245 disciples of Christ? If so, they withhold from Jesus. Do you expect the Lord
- 246 to rain down grain from heaven to supply the needy? Has He not rather
- 247 placed it in your hands, to help and bless them through you? Has He not
- 248 made you His instrument in this good work to prove you, and to give you
- 249 the privilege of laying up a treasure in heaven? {2T 32.2}
- 250 Fatherless and motherless children are thrown into the arms of the church, and
- 251 Christ says to His followers: Take these destitute children, bring them up for
- 252 Me, and ye shall receive your wages. I have seen much selfishness exhibited in
- 253 these things. Unless there is some special evidence that they themselves are
- 254 to be benefited by adopting into their family those who need homes, some
- 255 turn away and answer: No. They do not seem to know or care whether such
- 256 are saved or lost. That, they think, is not their business. With Cain they say:
- 257 "Am I my brother's keeper?" They are not willing to be put to
- 258 inconvenience or to make any sacrifice for the orphans, and they
- 259 indifferently thrust such ones into the arms of the world, who are
- 260 sometimes more willing to receive them than are these professed
- 261 **Christians**. In the day of God, inquiry will be made for those whom Heaven
- 262 gave them the opportunity of saving. But they wished to be excused, and would
- 263 not engage in the good work unless they could make it a matter of profit to
- 264 them. I have been shown that those who refuse these opportunities for doing
- 265 good will hear from Jesus: "As ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did
- 266 it not to Me." Please read Isaiah 58: {2T 33.1}
- 267 "Is it such a fast that I have chosen? a day for a man to afflict his soul? is it to
- 268 bow down his head as a bulrush, and to spread sackcloth and ashes under him?
- 269 wilt thou call this a fast, and an acceptable day to the Lord? Is not this the fast
- 270 that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy
- 271 burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke? Is it not
- 272 to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to
- 273 thy house? when thou seest the naked, that thou cover him; and that thou hide
- 274 not thyself from thine own flesh? Then shall thy light break forth as the
- 275 morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily: and thy righteousness
- 276 shall go before thee; the glory of the Lord shall be thy rearward. Then shalt
- 277 thou call, and the Lord shall answer; thou shalt cry, and He shall say, Here I
- 278 am. If thou take away from the midst of thee the yoke, the putting forth of the
- 279 finger, and speaking vanity; and if thou draw out thy soul to the hungry, and
- 280 satisfy the afflicted soul; then shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy darkness
- 281 be as the noonday: and the Lord shall guide thee continually, and satisfy thy
- 282 soul in drought, and make fat thy bones: and thou shalt be like a watered
- 283 garden, and like a spring of water, whose waters fail not." {2T 33.2}
- 284 This is the special work now before us. All our praying and abstinence
- 285 from food will avail nothing unless we resolutely lay hold of this work.
- 286 Sacred obligations are resting upon us. Our duty is plainly stated. The Lord

- 287 has spoken to us by His prophet. The thoughts of the Lord and His ways are not
- 288 what blind, selfish mortals believe they are or wish them to be. The Lord looks
- 289 on the heart. If selfishness dwells there, He knows it. We may seek to conceal
- 290 our true character from our brethren and sisters, but God knows. Nothing can
- 291 be hid from Him. {2T 34.1}
- 292 The fast which God can accept is described. It is to deal thy bread to the
- 293 hungry and to bring the poor which are cast out to thy house. Wait not for
- 294 them to come to you. The labor rests not on them to hunt you up and
- 295 entreat of you a home for themselves. You are to search for them and
- 296 **bring them to your house.** You are to draw out your soul after them. You are
- 297 with one hand to reach up and by faith take hold of the mighty arm which
- 298 brings salvation, while with the other hand of love you reach the oppressed and
- 299 relieve them. It is impossible for you to fasten upon the arm of God with
- 300 one hand while the other is employed in ministering to your own pleasure.
- 301 {2T 34.2}
- 302 If you engage in this work of mercy and love, will the work prove too hard
- 303 for you? Will you fail and be crushed under the burden, and your family
- 304 be deprived of your assistance and influence? Oh, no; God has carefully
- 305 removed all doubts upon this question, by a pledge to you on condition of
- 306 your obedience. This promise covers all that the most exacting, the most
- 307 hesitating, could crave. "Then shall thy light break forth as the morning,
- 308 and thine health shall spring forth speedily." Only believe that He is
- 309 **faithful that hath promised**. God can renew the physical strength. And more,
- 310 He says He will do it. And the promise does not end here. "Thy righteousness
- 311 shall go before thee; the glory of the Lord shall be thy rearward." God will
- 312 build a fortification around thee. The promise does not stop even here. "Then
- 313 shalt thou call, and the Lord shall answer; thou shalt cry, and He shall say, Here
- 314 I am." If ye put down oppression and remove the speaking of vanity, if ye draw
- 315 out your soul to the hungry, "then shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy
- 316 darkness be as the noonday: and the Lord shall guide thee continually, and
- 317 satisfy thy soul in drought [famine], and make fat thy bones: and thou shalt be
- 318 like a watered garden, and like a spring of water, whose waters fail not." {2T
- 319 35.1}
- 320 Read Isaiah 58, ye who claim to be children of the light. Especially do you
- 321 read it again and again who have felt so reluctant to inconvenience
- 322 vourselves by favoring the needy. You whose hearts and houses are too
- 323 narrow to make a home for the homeless, read it; you who can see orphans
- 324 and widows oppressed by the iron hand of poverty and bowed down by
- 325 hardhearted worldlings, read it. Are you afraid that an influence will be
- 326 introduced into your family that will cost you more labor, read it. Your fears
- 327 may be groundless, and a blessing may come, known and realized by you
- 328 every day. But if otherwise, if extra labor is called for, you can draw upon
- 329 One who has promised: "Then shall thy light break forth as the morning, and
- 330 thine health shall spring forth speedily." The reason why God's people are
- 331 not more spiritually minded and have not more faith, I have been shown,
- 332 is because they are narrowed up with selfishness. The prophet is addressing
- 332 is because they are narrowed up with senishiess. The propiet is utures
- 333 Sabbathkeepers, not sinners, not unbelievers, but those who make great
- 334 pretensions to godliness. It is not the abundance of your meetings that God
- 335 accepts. It is not the numerous prayers, but the rightdoing, doing the right

- 336 thing and at the right time. It is to be less self-caring and more benevolent.
- 337 Our souls must expand. Then God will make them like a watered garden,
- 338 whose waters fail not. {2T 35.2}
- 339 Read Isaiah 1: "And when ye spread forth your hands, I will hide Mine eyes
- 340 from you: yea, when ye make many prayers, I will not hear: your hands are full
- 341 of blood. Wash you, make you clean; put away the evil of your doings from
- 342 before Mine eyes; cease to do evil; learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve the
- 343 oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow. Come now, and let us
- 344 reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as
- 345 white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool. If ye be
- 346 willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land: but if ye refuse and
- 347 rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword: for the mouth of the Lord hath
- 348 spoken it." {2T 36.1}
- 349 The gold mentioned by Christ, the True Witness, which all must have, has
- 350 been shown me to be faith and love combined, and love takes the
- 351 **precedence of faith**. Satan is constantly at work to remove these precious gifts
- 352 from the hearts of God's people. All are engaged in playing the game of life.
- 353 Satan is well aware that if he can remove love and faith, and supply their
- 354 place with selfishness and unbelief, all the remaining precious traits will
- 355 soon be skillfully removed by his deceitful hand, and the game will be lost.
- 356 {2T 36.2}
- 357 My dear brethren, will you allow Satan to accomplish his purpose? Will you
- 358 submit to lose the game in which you desire to win everlasting life? If God has
- 359 ever spoken by me, you will just as surely be overcome by Satan, instead of
- 360 being overcomers, as the throne of God stands sure, unless you are entirely
- 361 transformed. Love and faith must be won back. Will you engage in this conflict
- 362 anew and win back the precious gifts of which you are nearly destitute? You
- 363 will have to make efforts more earnest, more persevering and untiring, than you
- 364 have ever yet made. It is not merely to pray or fast, but it is to be obedient, to
- 365 divest yourselves of selfishness, and keep the fast which God has chosen,
- 366 which He will accept. Many may feel grieved because I have spoken
- 367 plainly; but this I shall continue to do, if God lays the burden upon me.

- 369 God requires that those who occupy responsible positions should be
- 370 consecrated to the work; for if they move wrong, the people feel at liberty to
- 371 follow in their footsteps. If the people are wrong, and the leaders lift not their
- 372 voice against the wrong, they sanction the same, and the sin is charged upon
- 373 them as well as the offenders. Those who occupy responsible positions should
- 374 be men of piety, who continually feel the burden of the work resting upon
- 375 them. {2T 37.2}
