- 436 obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land: but if ye refuse and
- 437 rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword: for the mouth of the
- 438 Lord hath spoken it." {2T 36.1}
- 439 The gold mentioned by Christ, the True Witness, which all
- 440 must have, has been shown me to be faith and love
- 441 combined, and love takes the precedence of faith. Satan is
- 442 constantly at work to remove these precious gifts from the
- 443 hearts of God's people. All are engaged in playing the game of
- 444 life. Satan is well aware that if he can remove love and
- 445 faith, and supply their place with selfishness and unbelief,
- 446 all the remaining precious traits will soon be skillfully
- 447 removed by his deceitful hand, and the game will be lost.
- 448 {2T 36.2}
- 449 My dear brethren, will you allow Satan to accomplish his
- 450 purpose? Will you submit to lose the game in which you desire
- 451 to win everlasting life? If God has ever spoken by me, you will
- 452 just as surely be overcome by Satan, instead of being
- 453 overcomers, as the throne of God stands sure, unless you are
- 454 entirely transformed. Love and faith must be won back. Will
- 455 you engage in this conflict anew and win back the precious
- 456 gifts of which you are nearly destitute? You will have to make
- 457 efforts more earnest, more persevering and untiring, than you
- 458 have ever yet made. It is not merely to pray or fast, but it is to
- 459 be obedient, to divest yourselves of selfishness, and keep the
- 460 fast which God has chosen, which He will accept. Many may
- 461 feel grieved because I have spoken plainly; but this I shall
- 462 continue to do, if God lays the burden upon me. {2T 37.1}
- 402 continue to do, ii God lays the burden upon me. {21 3/...
- 463 God requires that those who occupy responsible positions
- 464 should be consecrated to the work; for if they move wrong, the
- 465 people feel at liberty to follow in their footsteps. If the people
- 466 are wrong, and the leaders lift not their voice against the
- 467 wrong, they sanction the same, and the sin is charged upon
- 468 them as well as the offenders. Those who occupy responsible
- 469 positions should be men of piety, who continually feel the
- 470 burden of the work resting upon them. {2T 37.2}

- 1 Chapter 2—Doing for Christ
- 2 From what has been shown me, Sabbathkeepers are growing
- 3 more selfish as they increase in riches. Their love for Christ
- 4 and His people is decreasing. They do not see the wants of the
- 5 needy, nor feel their sufferings and sorrows. *They do not*
- 6 realize that in neglecting the poor and the suffering they
- 7 neglect Christ, and that in relieving the wants and sufferings
- 8 of the poor as far as possible, they minister to Jesus. {2T 9 24.1}
- 10 Christ says to His redeemed people: "Come, ye blessed of My
- 11 Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the
- 12 foundation of the world: for I was an hungered, and ye gave
- 13 Me meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave Me drink; I was a stranger,
- 14 and ye took Me in: naked, and ye clothed Me: I was sick, and
- 15 ye visited Me: I was in prison, and ye came unto Me. {2T 16 24.2}
- 17 "Then shall the righteous answer Him, saying, Lord, when saw
- 18 we Thee an hungered, and fed Thee? or thirsty, and gave Thee
- 19 drink? When saw we Thee a stranger, and took Thee in? or
- 20 naked, and clothed Thee? Or when saw we Thee sick, or in
- 21 prison, and came unto Thee? And the King shall answer and
- 22 say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have
- 23 done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done
- 24 it unto Me." {2T 24.3}
- 25 To become a toiler, to continue patiently in well-doing
- 26 which calls for self-denying labor, is a glorious work, which
- 27 Heaven smiles upon. Faithful work is more acceptable to
- 28 God than the most zealous and thought-to-be holiest worship.
- 29 It is working together with Christ that is true worship. Prayers,
- 30 exhortation, and talk are cheap fruits, which are frequently
- 31 tied on; but fruits that are manifested in good works, in
- 32 caring for the needy, the fatherless, and widows, are
- 33 genuine fruits, and grow naturally upon a good tree. {2T
- 34 24.4}
- 35 Pure religion and undefiled before the Father is this: "To visit

- 36 the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep
- 37 himself unspotted from the world." Good deeds are the fruit
- 38 that Christ requires us to bear: kind words, deeds of
- 39 benevolence, of tender regard for the poor, the needy, the
- 40 afflicted. When hearts sympathize with hearts burdened
- 41 with discouragement and grief, when the hand dispenses to
- 42 the needy, when the naked are clothed, the stranger made
- 43 welcome to a seat in your parlor and a place in your heart,
- 44 angels are coming very near, and an answering strain is
- 45 responded to in heaven. Every act of justice, mercy, and
- 46 benevolence makes melody in heaven. The Father from His
- 47 throne beholds those who do these acts of mercy, and numbers
- 48 them with His most precious treasures. "And they shall be
- 49 Mine, saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up My
- 50 jewels." Every merciful act to the needy, the suffering, is
- 51 regarded as though done to Jesus. When you succor the poor,
- 52 sympathize with the afflicted and oppressed, and befriend the
- 53 orphan, you bring yourselves into a closer relationship to Jesus.
- 54 {2T 25.1}
- 55 "Then shall He say also unto them on the left hand, Depart
- 56 from Me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil
- 57 and his angels: for I was an hungered, and ye gave Me no meat:
- 58 I was thirsty, and ye gave Me no drink: I was a stranger, and ye
- 59 took Me not in: naked, and ye clothed Me not: sick, and in
- 60 prison, and ye visited Me not. Then shall they also answer Him,
- 61 saying, Lord, when saw we Thee an hungered, or athirst, or a
- 62 stranger, or naked, or sick, or in prison, and did not minister
- 63 unto Thee? Then shall He answer them, saying, Verily I say
- 64 unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these,
- 65 ye did it not to Me. And these shall go away into everlasting
- 66 punishment: but the righteous into life eternal." Matthew
- 67 25:41-46. {2T 25.2}
- 68 Jesus here identifies Himself with His suffering people. It was
- 69 I who was hungry and thirsty. It was I who was a stranger.
- 70 It was I who was naked. It was I who was sick. It was I who
- 71 was in prison. When you were enjoying the food from your
- 72 bountifully spread tables, I was famishing in the hovel or
- 73 street not far from you. When you closed your doors
- 74 against Me, while your well-furnished rooms were
- 75 unoccupied, I had not where to lay My head. Your

- 396 shall say, Here I am." If ye put down oppression and remove
- 397 the speaking of vanity, if ye draw out your soul to the hungry,
- 398 "then shall thy light rise in obscurity, and thy darkness be as
- 399 the noonday: and the Lord shall guide thee continually, and
- 400 satisfy thy soul in drought [famine], and make fat thy bones:
- 401 and thou shalt be like a watered garden, and like a spring of
- 402 water, whose waters fail not." {2T 35.1}
- 403 Read Isaiah 58, ye who claim to be children of the light.
- 404 Especially do you read it again and again who have felt so
- 405 reluctant to inconvenience yourselves by favoring the
- 406 needy. You whose hearts and houses are too narrow to
- 407 make a home for the homeless, read it; you who can see
- 408 orphans and widows oppressed by the iron hand of poverty
- 409 and bowed down by hardhearted worldlings, read it. Are
- 410 you afraid that an influence will be introduced into your family
- 411 that will cost you more labor, read it. Your fears may be
- 412 groundless, and a blessing may come, known and realized
- 413 by you every day. But if otherwise, if extra labor is called
- 414 for, you can draw upon One who has promised: "Then shall
- 415 thy light break forth as the morning, and thine health shall
- 416 spring forth speedily." The reason why God's people are not
- 417 more spiritually minded and have not more faith, I have
- 418 been shown, is because they are narrowed up with
- 419 selfishness. The prophet is addressing Sabbathkeepers, not
- 420 sinners, not unbelievers, but those who make great
- 421 pretensions to godliness. It is not the abundance of your
- 422 meetings that God accepts. It is not the numerous prayers,
- 423 but the rightdoing, doing the right thing and at the right
- 424 time. It is to be less self-caring and more benevolent. Our
- 425 souls must expand. Then God will make them like a watered
- 426 garden, whose waters fail not. {2T 35.2}
- 427 Read Isaiah 1: "And when ye spread forth your hands, I will
- 428 hide Mine eyes from you: yea, when ye make many prayers, I
- 429 will not hear: your hands are full of blood. Wash you, make
- 430 you clean; put away the evil of your doings from before Mine
- 431 eyes; cease to do evil; learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve
- 432 the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow. Come
- 433 now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your
- 434 sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they
- 435 be red like crimson, they shall be as wool. If ye be willing and

- 356 and make fat thy bones: and thou shalt be like a watered
- 357 garden, and like a spring of water, whose waters fail not." {2T
- 358 33.2}
- 359 This is the special work now before us. All our praying and
- 360 abstinence from food will avail nothing unless we resolutely
- 361 lay hold of this work. Sacred obligations are resting upon
- 362 us. Our duty is plainly stated. The Lord has spoken to us by His
- 363 prophet. The thoughts of the Lord and His ways are not what
- 364 blind, selfish mortals believe they are or wish them to be. The
- 365 Lord looks on the heart. If selfishness dwells there, He knows
- 366 it. We may seek to conceal our true character from our brethren
- 367 and sisters, but God knows. Nothing can be hid from Him. {2T
- 368 34.1}
- 369 The fast which God can accept is described. It is to deal thy
- 370 bread to the hungry and to bring the poor which are cast
- 371 out to thy house. Wait not for them to come to you. The
- 372 labor rests not on them to hunt you up and entreat of you a
- 373 home for themselves. You are to search for them and bring
- 374 **them to your house.** You are to draw out your soul after them.
- 375 You are with one hand to reach up and by faith take hold of the
- 376 mighty arm which brings salvation, while with the other hand
- 377 of love you reach the oppressed and relieve them. It is
- 378 impossible for you to fasten upon the arm of God with one
- 379 hand while the other is employed in ministering to your
- 380 own pleasure. {2T 34.2}
- 381 If you engage in this work of mercy and love, will the work
- 382 prove too hard for you? Will you fail and be crushed under
- 383 the burden, and your family be deprived of your assistance
- 384 and influence? Oh, no; God has carefully removed all doubts
- 385 upon this question, by a pledge to you on condition of your
- 386 *obedience*. This promise covers all that the most exacting,
- 387 the most hesitating, could crave. "Then shall thy light break
- 388 forth as the morning, and thine health shall spring forth
- 389 speedily." Only believe that He is faithful that hath
- 390 **promised**. God can renew the physical strength. And more, He
- 391 says He will do it. And the promise does not end here. "Thy
- 392 righteousness shall go before thee; the glory of the Lord
- 393 shall be thy rearward." God will build a fortification
- 394 **around thee.** The promise does not stop even here. "Then shalt
- 395 thou call, and the Lord shall answer; thou shalt cry, and He

- 76 wardrobes were filled with an abundant supply of
- 77 changeable suits of apparel, upon which means had been
- 78 needlessly squandered, which you might have given to the
- 79 needy. I was destitute of comfortable apparel. When you
- 80 were enjoying health, I was sick. Misfortune cast Me into
- 81 prison and bound Me with fetters, bowing down My spirit,
- 82 depriving Me of freedom and hope, while you roamed free.
- 83 What a oneness Jesus here expresses as existing between
- 84 Himself and His suffering disciples! He makes their case
- 85 **His own.** He identifies Himself as being in person the very
- 86 sufferer. Mark, selfish Christian: every neglect of the needy
- 87 poor, the orphan, the fatherless, is a neglect of Jesus in their
- 88 **person.** {2T 25.3}
- 89 I am acquainted with persons who make a high profession,
- 90 whose hearts are so encased in self-love and selfishness that
- 91 they cannot appreciate what I am writing. They have all their
- 92 lives thought and lived only for self. To make a sacrifice to
- 93 do others good, to disadvantage themselves to advantage
- 94 others, is out of the question with them. They have not the
- 95 least idea that God requires this of them. Self is their idol.
- 96 Precious weeks, months, and years pass into eternity, but they
- 97 have no record in heaven of kindly acts, of sacrificing for
- 98 others' good, of feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, or
- 99 taking in the stranger. This entertaining strangers at a
- 100 venture is not agreeable. If they knew that all who sought to
- 101 share their bounty were worthy, then they might be
- 102 induced to do something in this direction. But there is virtue
- 103 in venturing something. Perchance we may entertain angels.
- 104 {2T 26.1}
- 105 There are orphans that should be cared for; but some will
- 106 not venture to undertake this, for it would bring them more
- 107 work than they care to do, leaving them but little time to
- 108 please themselves. But when the King shall make
- 109 investigation, these do-nothing, illiberal, selfish souls will
- 110 learn that heaven is for those who have been workers, those
- 111 who have denied themselves for Christ's sake. No provisions
- 112 have been made for those who have ever taken such special
- 113 care in loving and looking out for themselves. The terrible
- 114 punishment which the King threatens those on His left hand, in
- 115 this case, is not because of their great crimes. They are not

- 116 condemned for the things which they did do, but for that
- 117 which they did not do. You did not those things which Heaven
- 118 assigned you to do. You pleased yourself, and can take your
- 119 portion with self-pleasers. {2T 27.1}
- 120 To my sisters I would say: Be daughters of benevolence. The
- 121 Son of man came to seek and to save that which was lost. You
- 122 may have thought that if you could find a child without
- 123 fault, you would take it, and care for it; but to perplex your
- 124 mind with an erring child, to unlearn it many things and
- 125 teach it anew, to teach it self-control, is a work which you
- 126 refuse to undertake. To teach the ignorant, to pity and to
- 127 reform those who have ever been learning evil, is no slight
- 128 task; but Heaven has placed just such ones in your way.
- 129 They are blessings in disguise. {2T 27.2}
- 130 Years ago I was shown that God's people would be tested
- 131 upon this point of making homes for the homeless; that there
- 132 would be many without homes in consequence of their
- 133 *believing the truth.* Opposition and persecution would deprive
- 134 believers of their homes, and it was the duty of those who had
- 135 homes to open a wide door to those who had not. *I have*
- 136 been shown more recently that God would specially test His
- 137 *professed people in reference to this matter*. Christ for our
- 138 sakes became poor that we through His poverty might be made
- 139 rich. He made a sacrifice that He might provide a home for
- 140 pilgrims and strangers in the world seeking for a better country,
- 141 even an heavenly. Shall those who are subjects of His grace,
- 142 who are expecting to be heirs of immortality, refuse, or even
- 143 feel reluctant, to share their homes with the homeless and
- 144 needy? Shall we, who are disciples of Jesus, refuse strangers an
- 145 entrance to our doors because they can claim no acquaintance
- 146 with the inmates? {2T 27.3}
- 147 Has the injunction of the apostle no force in this age: "Be not
- 148 forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have
- 149 entertained angels unawares"? I am daily pained with
- 150 exhibitions of selfishness among our people. There is an
- 151 alarming absence of love and care for those who are
- 152 entitled to it. Our heavenly Father lays blessings disguised in
- 153 our pathway, but some will not touch these for fear they will
- 154 detract from their enjoyment. Angels are waiting to see if we
- 155 embrace opportunities within our reach of doing good—

- 316 Fatherless and motherless children are thrown into the arms of
- 317 the church, and Christ says to His followers: Take these
- 318 destitute children, bring them up for Me, and ye shall receive
- 319 your wages. I have seen much selfishness exhibited in these
- 320 things. Unless there is some special evidence that they
- 321 themselves are to be benefited by adopting into their family
- 322 those who need homes, some turn away and answer: No.
- 323 They do not seem to know or care whether such are saved or
- 324 lost. That, they think, is not their business. With Cain they
- 325 say: "Am I my brother's keeper?" They are not willing to
- 326 be put to inconvenience or to make any sacrifice for the
- 327 orphans, and they indifferently thrust such ones into the
- 328 arms of the world, who are sometimes more willing to
- 329 receive them than are these professed Christians. In the day
- 330 of God, inquiry will be made for those whom Heaven gave
- 331 them the opportunity of saving. But they wished to be excused,
- 332 and would not engage in the good work unless they could make
- 333 it a matter of profit to them. I have been shown that those who
- 334 refuse these opportunities for doing good will hear from Jesus:
- 335 "As ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to
- 336 Me." Please read Isaiah 58: {2T 33.1}
- 337 "Is it such a fast that I have chosen? a day for a man to afflict
- 338 his soul? is it to bow down his head as a bulrush, and to spread
- 339 sackcloth and ashes under him? wilt thou call this a fast, and an
- 340 acceptable day to the Lord? Is not this the fast that I have
- 341 chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy
- 342 burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break
- 343 every yoke? Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that
- 344 thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? when thou
- 345 seest the naked, that thou cover him; and that thou hide not
- 346 thyself from thine own flesh? Then shall thy light break forth
- 347 as the morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily: and
- 348 thy righteousness shall go before thee; the glory of the Lord
- 349 shall be thy rearward. Then shalt thou call, and the Lord shall
- 350 answer; thou shalt cry, and He shall say, Here I am. If thou take
- 351 away from the midst of thee the yoke, the putting forth of the
- 352 finger, and speaking vanity; and if thou draw out thy soul to the
- 353 hungry, and satisfy the afflicted soul; then shall thy light rise in
- 354 obscurity, and thy darkness be as the noonday: and the Lord
- 355 shall guide thee continually, and satisfy thy soul in drought,

276 When the request was made for the two sons of Zebedee to sit 277 the one on His right hand and the other on His left in His 278 kingdom, Jesus answered: "Ye know not what ye ask. Are ye 279 able to drink of the cup that I shall drink of, and to be baptized 280 with the baptism that I am baptized with? They say unto Him, 281 We are able. And He saith unto them, Ye shall drink indeed of 282 My cup, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized 283 with: but to sit on My right hand, and on My left, is not Mine to 284 give, but it shall be given to them for whom it is prepared of 285 My Father." How many can answer: We can drink of the cup; 286 we can be baptized with the baptism; and make the answer 287 understandingly? How many imitate the great Exemplar? All 288 who have professed to be followers of Christ have, in taking 289 this step, pledged themselves to walk even as He walked. Yet 290 the course of many who make high professions of the truth 291 shows that they make but little reference to the Pattern in 292 conforming their lives thereto. They shape their course to meet 293 their own imperfect standard. They do not imitate the self-294 denial of Christ or His life of sacrifice for others' good. {2T 295 32.1} 296 The poor, the homeless, and the widows are among us. I 297 heard a wealthy farmer describe the situation of a poor widow 298 among them. He lamented her straitened circumstances, and 299 then said: "I don't know how she is going to get along this cold 300 winter. She has close times now." Such have forgotten the 301 pattern, and by their acts say: "Nay, Lord, we cannot drink of 302 the cup of self-denial, humiliation, and sacrifice which You 303 drank of, nor be baptized with the suffering which You were 304 baptized with. We cannot live to do others good. It is our 305 business to take care of ourselves." Who should know how the 306 widow should get along unless it be those who have well-filled 307 granaries? The means for her to get along are at hand. And 308 dare those whom God has made His stewards, to whom He 309 has entrusted means, withhold from the needy disciples of 310 Christ? If so, they withhold from Jesus. Do you expect the 311 Lord to rain down grain from heaven to supply the needy? Has 312 He not rather placed it in your hands, to help and bless 313 them through you? Has He not made you His instrument in 314 this good work to prove you, and to give you the privilege of 315 laying up a treasure in heaven? {2T 32.2}

156 waiting to see if we will bless others, that they in their turn 157 may bless us. The Lord Himself has made us to differ,— 158 some poor, some rich, some afflicted,—that all may have an 159 opportunity to develop character. The poor are purposely 160 permitted to be thus of God, that we may be tested and 161 proved, and develop what is in our hearts. {2T 28.1} 162 I have heard many excuse themselves from inviting to their 163 homes and hearts the saints of God. "Why, I have nothing 164 **prepared, I have nothing cooked**; they must go to some other 165 place." And at that place there may be some other excuse 166 invented for not receiving those who need hospitality, and 167 the feelings of the visitors are deeply grieved, and they leave 168 with unpleasant impressions in regard to the hospitality of 169 these professed brethren and sisters. If you have no bread, 170 sister, imitate the case brought to view in the Bible. Go to 171 your neighbor and say: "Friend, lend me three loaves; for a 172 friend of mine in his journey is come to me, and I have 173 nothing to set before him." We have not an example of this 174 lack of bread ever being made an excuse to refuse entrance to 175 an applicant. When Elijah came to the widow of Sarepta, she 176 shared her morsel with the prophet of God, and he wrought a 177 miracle, and caused that in that act of making a home for his 178 servant, and sharing her morsel with him, she herself was 179 sustained, and her life and that of her son preserved. Thus will 180 it prove in the case of many, if they do this cheerfully, for the 181 glory of God. {2T 28.2} 182 Some plead their poor health—they would love to do if they 183 had strength. Such have so long shut themselves up to 184 themselves, and thought so much of their own poor feelings, 185 and talked so much of their sufferings, trials, and 186 afflictions, that it is their present truth. They can think of no 187 one but self, however much others may be in need of sympathy 188 and assistance. You who are suffering with poor health, 189 there is a remedy for you. If thou clothe the naked, and 190 bring the poor that are cast out to thy house, and deal thy 191 bread to the hungry, "then shall thy light break forth as the 192 morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily." 193 Doing good is an excellent remedy for disease. Those who 194 engage in the work are invited to call upon God, and He has 195 pledged Himself to answer them. Their soul shall be satisfied

- 196 in drought, and they shall be like a watered garden, whose
- 197 waters fail not. {2T 29.1}
- 198 Wake up, brethren and sisters. Do not be afraid of good works.
- 199 "Let us not be weary in well-doing: for in due season we shall
- 200 reap, if we faint not." Do not wait to be told your duty. Open
- 201 your eyes and see who are around you; make yourselves
- 202 acquainted with the helpless, afflicted, and needy. Hide not
- 203 yourselves from them, and seek not to shut out their needs.
- 204 Who gives the proofs mentioned in James, of possessing pure
- 205 religion, untainted with selfishness or corruption? Who are
- 206 anxious to do all in their power to aid in the great plan of
- 207 salvation? {2T 29.2}
- 208 I am acquainted with a widow who has two small children to
- 209 support, wholly by the use of her needle. She looks pale and
- 210 careworn. All through the hard winter she has struggled to
- 211 sustain herself and her children. She has received a little help,
- 212 but who would feel any lack if a still greater interest were
- 213 manifested in this case? Here are her two boys, aged about nine
- 214 and eleven years, who need homes. Who are willing to give
- 215 them homes for Christ's sake? The mother should be released
- 216 from this care and close confinement to her needle. These
- 217 boys are in a village, their only guardian their hard-working
- 218 mother. They need to be taught how to work as their age will
- 219 admit. They need to be patiently, kindly, lovingly instructed.
- 220 Some may say: "Oh, yes, I would take them and teach them
- 221 how to work." But they should not lose sight of other things
- 222 which these children need besides being taught to work. They
- 223 need to be instructed how they shall develop good Christian
- 224 character. They want love and affection, they need to be fitted
- 225 to become useful here, and finally to be prepared for heaven.
- 226 Disrobe yourselves of selfishness, and see if there are not many
- 227 whom you can help and bless with your homes, your sympathy,
- 228 your love, and in pointing them to the Lamb of God, who
- 229 taketh away the sins of the world. Do you wish to make any
- 230 sacrifice to save souls? Jesus, the dear Saviour, is preparing
- 231 a home for you; and why will not you in your turn prepare
- 232 a home for those who need it, and in thus doing imitate the
- 233 example of your Master? If you are not willing to do this,
- 234 when you shall feel that you need a habitation in the
- 235 heavens, none will be awarded you. For Christ declares:

- 236 "Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it
- 237 not to Me." You that have been selfish, studying your own ease
- 238 and advantage all your life, your hours of probation are fast
- 239 closing. What are you doing to redeem your life of selfishness
- 240 and uselessness? Wake up! wake up! {2T 30.1}
- 241 As you regard your eternal interest, arouse yourselves, and
- 242 begin to sow good seed. That which you sow, you shall also
- 243 reap. The harvest is coming—the great reaping time, when we
- 244 shall reap what we have sown. There will be no failure in the
- 245 crop; the harvest is sure. Now is the sowing time. Now make
- 246 efforts to be rich in good works, "ready to distribute, willing to
- 247 communicate," laying up in store for yourselves a good
- 248 foundation against the time to come, that ye "may lay hold on
- 249 eternal life." I implore you, my brethren in every place, rid
- 250 yourselves of your icy coldness. Encourage in yourselves a
- 251 love of hospitality, a love to help those who need help. {2T
- 252 31.1}
- 253 You may say you have been taken in and have bestowed
- 254 your means upon those unworthy of your charity, and
- 255 therefore have become discouraged in trying to help the
- 256 needy. I present Jesus before you. He came to save fallen
- 257 man, to bring salvation to His own nation; but they would
- 258 not accept Him. They treated His mercy with insult and
- 259 contempt, and at length they put to death Him who came
- 260 for the purpose of giving them life. Did our Lord turn from
- 261 the fallen race because of this? Though your efforts for good
- 262 have been unsuccessful ninety-nine times, and you received
- 263 only insult, reproach, and hate, yet if the one-hundredth time
- 264 proves a success, and one soul is saved, oh, what a victory is
- 265 achieved! One soul wrenched from Satan's grasp, one soul
- 266 benefited, one soul encouraged. This will a thousand times
- 267 repay you for all your efforts. To you will Jesus say: "Inasmuch
- 268 as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren,
- 269 ye have done it unto Me." Should we not gladly do all we can
- 270 to imitate the life of our divine Lord? Many shrink at the idea
- 271 of making any sacrifice for others' good. They are not willing
- 272 to suffer for the sake of helping others. They flatter themselves
- 273 that it is not required of them to disadvantage themselves for
- 274 the benefit of others. To such we say: Jesus is our example.
